



ottawa, July 25.—The Opposition amendment to Hon, Mr. Fielding's resolution to resume the reciprocity discussion in Parliament today was not permitted to come to a vote. It was prudently dropped by being defared "lost on division." The discussion related to the Premier's position at the Imperial Conference, and found the Opposition unable to a ree upon any specific criticism other than general condemnation of Canada's representation.

Mr. Monk, who submitted the amendment cailing for the production of the full text of the proceedings, condemned, because the Premier had not "stood alone for the autonomy of Canada," but had advocated and agreed to "a proposal under which there shall be cosultation" between the mother country and somewhat threadbare garb of "saver of the autonomy of Canada," surfainally Mr. W.
