LONDON AND DISTRICT

County Council Meeting. — A special meeting of the Middlesex county council will be held today at Melrose pond to consider repairs to the road between London and Lobo Townships.

Fell Into Pit Hole. — Stuart, the 10-year-old son of William Kennedy, 66 Byron avenue, who was injured Saturday afternoon about 5 o'clock by falling from the Grand Trunk tracks, is suffering considerably from the injuries which he received to his stomach and head in the fall. Mr. Kennedy states that his son fell into a pit hole at the London Electric Company's plant, and alighted on a cement bottom amongst some coal.

Presented With Umbrella. — Mr. C. A. Butterworth, retiring manager of the Miller Brass Company, was presented with a gold-headed umbrella by the employees on Saturday. An address of appreciation was read by Mr. W. J. Birch, and the presentation was made by Mr. O. Jackson on behalf of the employees. Mr. Butterworth, although taken entirely by surprise, made a suitable reply, thanking the employees for their present.

Writ Against Miller. — Acting on behalf of James Weir, of Maple Grove, M. P. McDonagh, of this city, has issued a writ against Miller Langford, a granton miller, asking for unpaid damages, which Mr. Weir is asking for injuries received through falling through an opening in the floor of the defendant's mill, while delivering a load of grain. The opening through which he fell, Mr. Weir alleges, was left open through the negligence of the mill owner, Mr. Langford.

Seventh's Good Parade. — The Seventh Regiment, which under command of Major W. A. McCrimmon goes to Hamilton on Thursday, had more than 250 men in line Monday night at its weekly parade. A large number of teachers (taking the six weeks' training course have temporarily joined the Seventh Regiment and will go to Hamilton with the corps on Thursday. They will muster at the armories at 7 o'clock. The regiment made a very creditable showing on Monday evening.

Joseph Coulter, foreman of the bakery, was the first witness called. He told the jury of starting from the first floor on the elevator on which were three men besides himself and Hewitt, also a load of empty cases. When nearing the bakeshop floor he tried to stop the elevator, and finding that he could not do so, he jumped off, calling to the other men as he did so, to step back and wait on the car until the next floor was reached, when they were to get off. After alighting from the car he took hold of the elevator cable, and tried to stop it, but he was unable to do so, and he pulled with all his might, but could not move the cable. Just before the car reached the ceiling of the third floor, Hewitt tried to get off the car feet first, and by throwing his arms around an arm which extended from one side of the car. Someone shouted to him, but he was unable to hear it, and he fell from the car and the ceiling of the room in a sitting position, and the car jammed.

Dr. Balfour, who was called to attend the injured man, when he reached him, but his pulse was scarcely discernible. The result of his post-mortem examination was that he died of hemorrhage, due to ruptures of the liver and right lung. The injuries, in his opinion, were caused by the crushing of the body.

Factory Inspector's Report. Mr. Harry Clark, factory inspector, gave evidence to the effect that the elevator, when examined by him three months ago, was in first-class condition, and was guarded as required by law, and he was not aware of any defect in the elevator Monday morning and evening.

At this point the foreman of the jury asked that Coulter be recalled, and questioned as to whether he pulled the wrong cable, in the box the foreman gave a description of the cables and their locations, and said that after the accident he had the proper cable in his hand. When he stepped from the car he still had the cable in his hand, and he pulled the proper one.

Charles Fidler was one of the men on the car at the time of the accident. He corroborated the testimony of Coulter.

Nothing attracted his attention until Coulter attempted to stop the hoist on the third floor. This Coulter was unable to do, according to the witness, and the former then jumped on the floor and pulled with all his might, and shouted to the men on the elevator to go up to the mixing room floor and get out of the elevator. Hewitt stepped forward. Just then he got in position to dive, as the witness said, and he jumped from the fourth floor, and instead of jumping from the floor of the car and the bottom of the four-story building, he was on account of Hewitt's body being wedged between it and the floor.

Edgar Lane, a youth who was also on the elevator at the time of the accident, gave evidence similar to that of Coulter and Fidler, with the exception that he did not see the accident occur.

John Gardner was also on the elevator at the time of the accident, but owing to a number of cases that were on the car at the time, he could not see what was going on.

John Brooks was standing near his machine on the bakeshop floor. He saw the elevator coming up and noticed Mr. Coulter step on. Coulter had hold of the rope at the time, and after stepping onto the floor, he pulled on the rope in an endeavor to stop the car.

Next he noticed Hewitt walk to the edge of the elevator floor and slip his feet over the edge. The next instant he caught between the elevator floor and the ceiling. The witness and Coulter then ran down two floors and it took the combined strength of the two of them to move the rope and let the car down a few feet to loosen Hewitt's body.

Albert Ashward was also on the bakeshop floor, and gave evidence similar to that of Brooks.

Superintendent Charles F. Benson said that the gear part of the elevator was inspected every day, and to his knowledge there was nothing wrong with it. After being notified of the accident he got on the elevator and rode to the fourth floor, and he did not notice the matter with the car, which responded every time he attempted to stop or start it.

MR. BANKS APPOINTED

Provincial Government Names Him as Justice of the Peace.

Toronto, Aug. 12.—Mr. W. Banks, sen., official theatrical censor for the city of Toronto, has been appointed a justice of the peace by the Ontario Government.

Mr. Banks has been in Canada about thirty years, and has been in newspaper work all his life. He is an enthusiastic Scotsman, and has held high offices in most of the large Scottish organizations. His chief work is as one of the relief committee of St. Andrew's Society. Mr. Banks is a manager of Berkeley Street Methodist Church. He has in past years studied moral reform subjects and has written a series of special articles on the subject.
