

# All Greece Crying for War With the Bulgars

First Soldiers From Kavala R eturn Demanding That Greece Enter Conflict - Anti-Venizelos Press To Demand Nation's Participation.

Athens, Sept. 16, via London, Sept. 18, delayed. -The first boatload of Greek soldiers from Kavala arrived here today. The men marched through the streets cheering King Constantine and crying, "Down with the Bulgars." The demand for war is growing rapidly among the people. Even the anti-Venizelos press plans an active pro-war campaign, which will be opened tomorrow.

"A VERY BENEVOLENT NEUTRALITY."

Athens, Sept. 16, midnight, via London, Sept. 18, 5:05 a.m., delayed.—Nikolas Kalageropoulos, the new premier, made the following declarations today:

"The new ministry will follow a benevolent, a very benevolent, neutrality toward the Entente. It will decide its attitude in other respects after examining the situation and studying the diplomatic documents."

Premier Kalageropoulos indignantly repudiated any suggestion that he is pro-German in his sympathies. The cabinet was sworn in at noon.
