



Popular Labor Leader Leaves For a Trip to Mexico.

John Colbert, ex-alderman, will not e a candidate in the city aldermanic election on Dec. 1. He emphatically stated last evening, before leaving for a month's trip to El Paso, Texas, that he was definitely going to stay out of the contest.

Report among some labor men is that they might elect Mr. Colbert in his absence and that their campaign would be sufficiently vigorous to get the popular street railway union president a position on the council. He has a big following, and is popular among the trades union. "I'm not thinking of running at all," Mr. Colbert told the Advertiser when asked for a definite statement.
