COLBERT WILL NOT SEEK COUNCIL POST

Popular Labor Leader Leaves For a Trip to Mexico.

John Colbert, ex-alderman, will not be a candidate in the city aldermanic election on Dec. 1. He emphatically stated last evening, before leaving for a month's trip to El Paso, Texas, that he was definitely going to stay out of the contest.

Report among some labor men is that they might elect Mr. Colbert in his absence, and that their campaign would be sufficiently vigorous to get the popular street railway union president a position on the council. He has a big following, and is popular among the trades union.

"I'm not thinking of running at all," Mr. Colbert told the Advertiser when asked for a definite statement. It was pointed out this week by railwaymen's officials that Mr. Colbert could be nominated in his absence, that he could qualify by proxy. Mr. Colbert was named as a delegate to the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which is meeting in the Texas city the latter part of this month.

Mrs. Colbert accompanied her husband on the trip south last night.

MANY BRITISH LETTERS ARE SHORT OF POSTAGE

Hundreds of letters addressed to the British Isles are posted in London bearing insufficient postage, say postal officials who point out that the rate to points in the United Kingdom and British possessions is four cents for the first ounce and three cents for each additional ounce. The rate for points in Canada is three cents for the first ounce and two cents for each additional ounce.

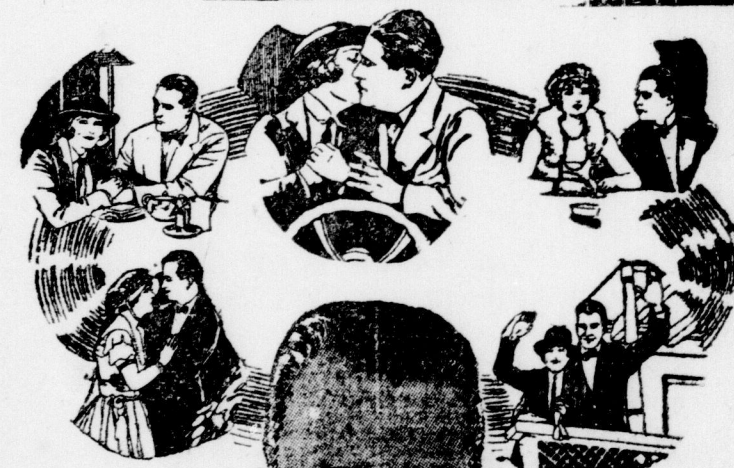
