BOMBARDMENT OF VALPARAISO

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

Valparaiso by the Spanish Fleet.

For nearly three hours the fire was kept up without intermission. At 10:40 a. m., a shell from the Vencedora set fire to the bath adjoining the Hotel de la Union, and the flames rapidly spread in three streets, but the Vencedora did not desist; ber shot continued to rain on that part of the town up to the last moment of the bombardment with (terrible and fatal regularity. On the other side the custom house took fire at 11:34, but there was no cessation of firing from the abips; indeed, the Spanish knew only one consideration, viz.: that Valparaiso had been given up to them to wreak their vengence on. At 8:10 p.m., the Numancia signalled" to desist, and the vessels of the squadron drew off.
