Chicago, Sept. 9.—The discovery of three human bodies at 2,709 State street, has started an investigation of the premises by the police, the coroner and the city department. One of the bodies was that of an adult, and the authorities are prepared to believe that murder was committed, or that it is simply evidence of an illegal burial. The other two bodies are those of babies. They were found in a wooden box, covered with sawdust, in the undertaking establishment of Charles Johnson, 2,709 State street. The undertaker says there was but one body in the box, and he produced a burial permit for it. Wm. McKissock, a plumber, who made the discovery, asserts there were two bodies. 
