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The experiments have been made on the boat containing from two to six persons. M. Trouin's electric motor consisted of a Siemens coil, which by a simple but ingenious arrangement is made to transmit its power to a three-bladed screw at the stern of the boat, which is fixed to the upper part of the rudder, which it follows in its movements, as does also the screw. The motor, with its accessories, does not weigh more than five kilograms.

M. Trouin's apparatus was adapted to any boat, and there seems no reason whatever why it might not be so modified as to be applicable to vessels of much larger dimensions than that experimented on. Experiments in navigation by electricity were made on the Neva in 1839 by Jacobi, but the method adopted had so many drawbacks as to be practically useless.
