

CRIME IN TORONTO

The City Does Not Appear to Be Growing in Wealth. The report of Chief Constable Grasett has been submitted to the Mayor. The offenders are classed according to nationality as follows: Canadian, 432; Irish, 1738; English, 1492; Scotch, 334; United States, 283; colored, 79; German, 42; all others, 183.

Offenders to the number of 399 were apprehended and summoned. This is a decrease of 893 as compared with the figures of 1891. While the offenders exceed those of 1891 a close examination does not show an increase of any serious criminality. The aggregate value of property reported lost or stolen was \$65,323, against \$68,778 in 1891. The police recovered \$48,130 worth, compared with \$54,560 the previous year.

The nature of the offences and the number during the year by \$702,222. This is a decrease of six as compared with last year. This decrease has been brought about by refraining from filling the places of the men who left or were discharged. Discipline has been well maintained. Only nine of the men were fined for intoxication during the year.

THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE

An interesting discussion respecting the new Court House. The first meeting of the amalgamated Property and Market and License Committees was held yesterday afternoon. Ald. Crawford, the chairman, announced that the meeting was a special one, called to consider the Court House matter.

The opinion of D'Alton McCarthy in reference to the relative positions occupied by the architect and the City in connection with this question was then read. In Mr. McCarthy's opinion the architect occupies the position of a quasi trustee, and it is for him to say just how the work will henceforth be carried on.

The committee was again, at this decision, which placed them in a rather peculiar position, inasmuch as the City through them is responsible for the architect's work. The opinion of Mr. McCarthy the architect should be allowed to proceed with the work as he deems best without being interfered with by the committee.

Ald. J. E. Verral moved that Mr. Lennox be advised to proceed with the work by day labor, but withdrew the motion by request. The Mayor proposed the advisability of advertising for tenders and asking the architect to give his opinion as to whether he could do the work by day labor cheaper than the lowest tender figure.

The further discussion of the question was deferred until Monday. A deputation will visit on Monday Mr. McCarthy to ascertain the architect's opinion as to his position to advise the architect as to his mode of procedure.

The question as to whether fire-proofing ought or ought not to be used in the construction of the Court House occasioned considerable discussion, and Mr. Lennox was instructed to furnish the committee with the probable difference in price. It was decided that all applications for the renewal of transfers of property should be made in future to be referred to the City Solicitor and Assessment Commissioner to ascertain if the original conditions were complied with.

The use of the Drill Shed was granted for the Horse Association's annual spring show.

WISH TO LOCATE IN TORONTO

A Number of Manufacturing Establishments anxious to Remove Here. A delegation composed of Messrs. J. N. Blake, P. G. Close, T. M. Lamb, Joseph Barrett, Ex-Ald. McDermott, Robert Elliot, Richard Macdonnell, T. M. Livingston and Arthur Harvey from the Citizens' Industrial Association conferred with a committee appointed by the council, composed of the Mayor and Ald. Bell, Jolliffe and Carlyle, yesterday, re the terms which could be offered to manufacturers wishing to locate in the city.

Ald. Bell occupied the chair and Mr. J. N. Blake read letters from companies wishing to establish manufacturing in Toronto. The Toronto Rubber Company of Port Huron would like to move its plant to the city. They employ 200 hands and would require a site about four acres of land.

The McCormack Harvesting and Machine Company of Chicago, employing from 300 to 500 hands, are looking for a location in Canada. The company will sink about half a million dollars in the plant and buildings.

A willowware manufacturing company would also like to locate here if sufficient inducements were held forth. The Mayor advised the settling of a policy as to what can be offered manufacturers and the sending it broadcast over the country. The solution of the difficulty, he thought, lay in the reclamation of Ashbridge's Bay and the building of a site to prospective locates in the city.

It was decided to request City Surveyor Sankey to mark off on a plan suitable sites for manufacturing purposes owned by the city.

Dieks, Fordwich, for recovery on a number of promissory notes, there was an understanding that the case would be traversed to the next assize on defendant paying the costs of enlargement. As no defence was submitted, judgment was entered for Mr. Petrie for \$342.50 and the costs of the suit.
