Our Weekly Sermons

"The Shadow of Influence."

They brought the sick into the streets and laid them on beds and couches, that at least the shadow of Peter passing by might overshadow some of them.—Acts v, 15

Whether the shadow of Peter healed or not, we do not know, but it is evident from the account that people recognized that the very presence of such a man as Peter must be beneficial. If the shadow of Peter healed the sick, it must have been by an unconscious influence, and it strikingly illustrates the fact that we are constantly in our daily lives exerting an influence upon others.

We are all casting shadows. The shadows of parents' influence fall upon the lives of their children and are never lifted. Your friends and acquaintances exert their unconscious influence upon you and you upon them. Some men are always without seeming effort or thought making other people happy. Meet them where you will and their smiling faces and cheerful voices and cordial pressure of the hand, encourage and comfort and cheer you. On the other hand there are people whose very presence depresses. Lord Lytton in his "Mr. Wormwood" drew a representative character. "Every day he has some new distress to relate. He goes home at night like an undertaker to a funeral and the children cease singing and the wife refrains from smiles. In the morning he goes abroad like a Scotch mist from the highlands, to drizzle discontent in the streets and market place. He enters the house of God to render all its songs of praise into dirges and his religious light shines, as if it came through leaden glass." So we go through life diffusing our influence and some are like palms before a fountain and others like cypresses over graves.

What a scene it must have been when Peter walked that day through the streets. How eagerly the people crowded upon his footsteps. It seemed to them as if this old fisherman of Galilee were a very angel of God.

But look, through another street another day is passing. The priest has just pronounced him "a leper" and with bare head and covered lip he is on his way to the wilderness. See how people recoil from him and dread his very shadow. See how they hasten from his path as he goes on his way crying "Unclean! Unclean!"

Let us apply the parable so that in our daily walk among men the world may be cleaner, more joyous and a better place to live in because we live in it.

But the lesson goes deeper than this. The unconscious influence of a man's life is far greater than we estimate. It is like those great forces of nature the color of the sun, the force of gravitation, unobtrusive, "unconscious," yet all-pervading. Now, let us impress the one point, that we are solemnly responsible for the influence which our life exerts upon others. A child hears you speak at things that are sacred or bears a curse from your lips and repeats it, and you are responsible for the seed which has been planted in that child's mind. With every word we speak, with every look, with every breath we draw, we put forth these unconscious influences for good or evil. Our whole mortal life is embodied force diffusing itself to all with whom we come in contact.

Now does that force cease when death has disembodied it. Our influence lingers long after we have left the scene of our labors. There is a true sense in which our ghosts walk the earth. St. Peter no longer walks the streets but his spirit lives with us. Is St. Paul dead? Are the great reformers dead? Are the founders of this republic dead? Do they not still live in the daily influence which they exert upon our lives? A little child came into your home like a ray of sunlight, and one dark day it departed from you. But it is not child's bright laughter still in your heart when the twilight deepens? Your mother left you when you were but young and inexperienced, but is not that mother's kiss and her prayers still an influence in your life? Nay, our influences never die. Our shadows fall across many of whom we know not. May God teach us that ours is a solemn prerogative. May it be a solemn warning to the careless and wicked who are responsible not only for their own lives, but probably for the ruin of many another life. Let this truth be impressed upon parents. Parents, you are shaping the destiny of your children with the unconscious influence of your own lives. Let it be impressed upon all who come in contact with children while their characters are in the shaping, that they bear a mighty responsibility before God.

But primarily the "shadow" is a symbol of blessing. "A good man," says Isaiah "shall be to his generation as the shadow of a great rock in a weary land." Let us all strive in our daily life to throw a shadow which is helping to make the world better, and let us remember that if we are walking uprightly and doing our work in the spirit of the Master we are unconsciously exerting a great influence for good.

THE CARNIVAL OF VENICE
