RETIREMENT OF MR. GREEN.

We have to announce that MR. G. W. GREEN, who has been editor of the The Canadian Live Stock and Farm Journal, and its successor, FARMING, since August, 1892, has resigned the position to take up another line of work. APPOINTMENT OF MR. HARCOURT.

As announced in another place, we propose that FARMING shall take many steps in advance during the next twelve months. No business, no publication, can now-a-days meet the demands of the times unless it keeps constantly moving forward. To attain this end the publishers of FARMING will spare no pains and no expense. The general management of the magazine will be under the direction of MR. J. E. BRYANT, who has been associated with its business management since August, 1889.
