RETIREMENT OF MR. GREEN.

We have to announce that MR. G. W. GREEN,
who has been editor of the *The Canadian Live Stock
and Farm Journal*, and its successor, FARMING, since
August, 1892, has resigned the position to take
up another line of work. We desire here to express
our deep sense of the fidelity and ability with which
Mr. Green has discharged all the duties of his post.
Mr. Green from the beginning won, and ever since

especially of all stockmen, as an expert in his pro-
fession, and as an editorial writer of the utmost

APPOINTMENT OF MR. HARCOURT.
