## Waterous E <br> The petrified wood that is so abundant in the

United States Territorien of Arizona and Wyoming and the Rucky Mountain regions, is rapidly becoming utilized. In San Francicico there is now a factory for cuttirg and polihhing these petrifications into mantie pieces, tiles, tablets and other ançitectural parts for which marble or sata is commonly used. Petrified wood is said to be susceptible of a finer polish than marble, or even ongx, the latter of which it is driving from the market.' Theraw material employed comes mostly from the foreats of petrified wood along the line of the Atlantic and Pacific Railway. Several other companies have also been formed to obtain concessions of different portions of theac forests. Geologists will regret the destruction of such interesting primeval remains, and nomo steps ought to be taken to presorve certain tracts in their origin al stata.

first issue. They take fully paid 33,833 shares of the presirit issue. The tranafer of the bus. iness is to inclurde tho leasehold offices and premises belonging to the firm in London, Quebec and Montreal, with all fixtures, furni ture and fittings therein. ## AN INTRRESTING OASE.

The case of Queen v. St. Catharines Milling and Lumber Company was commencad on Thureday before the Court of Appealin Tomato. The Plaintiffs in the action are the Ontamo Government, who sue the St. Cathernnes Milling and Lumber Company to 1 atrain them from interfering with certan tumber. The defendants are licensees from the Dominion Government of the timber upon an area of land coverng 55,000 mquare miles, situated in tho noighborhood of Lako Wabigoon in the district of Algoma, and under their license have been cutting the timber. It in claimed, on behalf of the defendanta, that tho land in question belonged originally to the Indians, that by the Northweat Angle Treaty No. 3, in consideration of certain re. servations then made to them, and of the pay. ment of perpetual annuites, tho Indians codad the territory to the Dominion Government, and it is now theirs to dispose of, and further that the lands are ualdispcsed of by tho British North America Act, and therefore go to the Dominion. On the othr- hand the Ontano Government contends that the Indians never had any title, and that even if thoy had, the cossion by them would make the lands Crown Lands, and so they would go to tho Province. It is contended further tha- the lands aro within the limits of the Provinet and are public lands of the Pro vince subject to provincial rule. The caso was tried in the first instance some monthas apo by

Chancellor Boyc. who decided in favor of the claims of Ontario. Mr. McCarthy, Q. C., opened the case for the defendants. With him are Messrs. A. R \& W. Creeman, while the p!sintilifs are zepresonted by the AttorneyGeneral, and Messrs. Cabeels, U. C., and D. Mills, of London. The Dominion Government is not a party to the suit and hence is uncepre sented.-M(ail.

LARGEST OUT ON RECORD
The Au Sable Saturday Night gives the following partieulars of the bug day's work of the Pack, Woods \& Cu. mill at Oscoda :-
Since the breaking of the mut cut record by tho Gratwick, Smith \& Fryor mill two weeks azo, Pack, Woods \& Co., of Uscudx, and been making preparations to eclipso all provious t.er formances, and last Wadnesday was the day set for tho work. The logs cut wero chote white pine and averaged about 21 to the 1,060 feet. The days run was on ono and one-half inch atuff. The number of logs cut was 1,003 , which scalod 442,830 feot. The loge were scaled by Ed. Donigan, one of the Boom Company's xcalors. It is castimated that tho lumber will overrun the lug scalo abrut 30,000 or $3 ; 000$ feet, so that tho amount of lumber sawed would be about 475,000 fect. Tho lath mill, run by Horaco Beacon, on the eame day cut 76,000 pieces. The mill had a number of break-downs during the day so that tho actual running tumo was less than $12 \frac{1}{2}$ hours. The circular sawyers wero Frank Pierce and Sam Utloy, and tho gang sanyer Jas. McDDonald. This is the largest day's cut ever made by a mall of the【ame capracity.

## THE OLDEST AMERIOAN LOG SCALER.

The oldest fcaler on the Sagnaw river, and perhapas in the Unitod States, is S. B. Brown, of East Sasinaw, who has been at the businews 35 yeara, having commencod in Manne 35 year ago, and has continued in the busineas since that time. While in Maine he salled on the ccoan in summer and acaled logs in the wood in winter. Mr. Brown has resided in Michigan about 28 years, and has scaled loge during that time, summer and winter, in the vicinity of Port Furon, St. Clair, and of late yoars on the Saginaw rivor, where has scaled, perhayw, twice as many loga as any other man. He once scaled $500,000,000$ feet of logs in 200 daya feat never buforo accomplished on the river. Of course ho does not mamsure every log with a scale rule. So accustumed has ho become to the business that he can tell the amount of lumber there is in a log by measuremont of the oye, and ho has the reputation of being unusually accurato and reliablo in his figures. Though Mr. Brown is verging close on to 80 yoars of age, ho appears at least 1.5 years younger, and is still in active sorvice. If there are any young fellows in the Saginsws who can "Rot awny with him" in a day's ocaling they have failed as yet to show up.-Exchange.
