address from the Rev. Dr. McKay, of Formosa. For several weeks we have been anticipating his visit, and, as many of his friends in town had been notified of his coming, he was greeted with a large and enthusiastic audience. The doctor's theme was "The Triumphs of the Gospel" among the Chinese of Formosa. He briefly sketched his labours among them for the past fifty-two years, and enumerated many of the great obstacles he had encountered, especially during the earlier part Among these, racial prejudices, national suspicion, of the work. official duplicity and ancestral ic latry were the hardest to overcome. He dwelt on the power that the gospel had exercised over the many who had been brought beneath its influence, and the earnestness that characterized the lives of many of the Chinese Christians. During these years sixty churches have been organized and a great amount of good accomplished. In conclusion he gave some earnest words of advice to the students in regard to their preparation for life's work, speaking more especially to those who have the foreign field in view. The doctor was accompanied by his Chinese student, who gave us a short address in his native tongue.
