

GROCERIES .- Whilst trade between city jobbers has been quiet a healthy business has occurred on country account, sugars and teas being the principal articles moving. The sugar market is still troubled with glutted supplies market is still troubled with glutted supplies of raw and refined, and, although theidemand is good for the senson, it is impossible to obtain better values. Samples of the new Hulifax refinery are on the market, and dealers pro-nounce them very fine, the crushed A being considered excellent quality, which can be bought at 64 to 64 c as to size of lot, but it is understood that 64 c has been accepted for a large quantity. Jamaica ginger 124c to 18c, cloves 13c to 18c, and nutmegs 55c to 80c. Rice is quiet at \$3.50.

HIDES, ETC .- The market for green city hides is unsettled; prices are irregular, and business is limited, but the feeling tends towards firmness. Receipts are light, and bis has been paid for No. 1 green. Quebec tanners, on the other hand, have combined and entered into an engagement not to pay over 94c for cured hides, and it is learned that shipments have this week and it is learned that shipments have this week been made to Quebcc. at that figure. One sale, however, of No. 1 Montreal cured was reported at 104c. Western buff hides have changed hands at 94c for No. 1, at 9c for B's, and at 84c for No. 2. Toronto hides are worth in this market 94c for No. 1 and 9c for No. 2, Hamilton at 94c No. 1 and 84c No. 2; Bellev ville 94c No. 1 and 84c No. 2.
