COUNTERFEITERS OF CANADA MONEY.

From the Detroit Tribune, May 13. Yesterday afternoon, between 3 and 4 entire Police force were engaged. All the particulars that are proper to publish at present are as follows:—On the lith of Feb. last, J. P. Whiting the jailor ascertained the whereabouts of an extensive manufactory of counterfeit money; and further that they were about to issue certain counterfeits of this money would be sent to this c ty and distributed through trusty agonts all over this State. He immediately set to work to find out who the agents were, and to lay plans whereby they could be brought to justice and from that time to this, in connection with Police Justice Bagg, he has been at work indefatigably.

But a short time since an exceedingly well executed counterfeit on the Providence Bank, Rhodo Island—a \$1 bill—was issued by the gang and circulated all over the country. It was rapidly taken and is no doubt in wide circulation now. The head quarters of the gaug is about 30 miles from the city of Montreal. He shortly after loarned that there would soon be issued a escape there. counterfeit \$10 on the City Bank of Mon-treal, very fairly executed, and, from the fact that counterfeits on Canada banks are of very rare occurrence, well calculated to decoive and be widnly circulated.

Last Saturday night he received information that \$50,000 of this money had arrived in town and was shortly to be distributed .-Monsures, wore immediately taken to nip the scheme in the bud. Plans having been matured, and officers designated to make arrests in different localities about half-past three yesterday afternoon, most of the arwere made Jailor Whiting, officer Special Constable Sicotte proceeded to an office kept by John Stowart, on At water Street, opposite Barclay's Foundry. This was estensibly a lumber and general business office. Here they found, as they ex-pected to do so, 'Stewart' in the very act of distributing those counterfeit bills to 'Augustus Sessor-Nelson Smith, Nathan Ward, and Steven Burnbam.' They were all taken into enstedy at once. On 'Stewari' was found of this money which was secured .-He has kept a saloon on the corner of Jefforson Avenue and First st., and has been engaged in this agency for some time past Jalier Whiting then came down to Baker's tavern, on the corner of Bates and Atwater sts., and wont into the bar room and told Mr B, that he desired to search his house by authority of a warrant which he had, and while he was talking with him Nathaniel Hall' came in and enquired for 'Gus Sessor,' Mr Whiting told him he was on his way to jail whore he ought to be also, and immedistely invited him to stop into snother room where he searched him. A \$5 bill counterfeit, on the Boston Bank and heavy slung shot were found upon him. He was sont to jail. The tavern was searched bu nothing was found. Mr Whiting and officers Love, Ray and

F. C. Chambers, a special, then proceeded to the house of Wm. Gunning (formerly a clork at C. P. Woodruff's Hardware store) on Labrose street, between Sixth and Seventh street, and arrested him. A search of the premises revealed, nothing, but this morning there was found, secreted in a wood pile in the rear of the house, between \$300 and \$400 in bogus two and a half dollar gold pieces, of which spurious coin, considerable has been circulated. In the evening, officers J Stadley, Mizner,

Eglington, and Sparling proceeded to the house of J. Parrish in Hamtramck, which they searched, but without finding anything. He was taken to jail and searched. On him was only found, however, some begus silver and gold coin.

A pediar of cutlery, and various notions, who kept a wagon on the dock near Chas, Savanack's cating house, and opposite the Contral Depot, named Wm. Hall, was also

arrosted by officers Mizner and Dings.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock, three officers
proceeded to the house of Jeshua Armstrong on Labrosso Street, Fourth and Fifth, to arrest him. Officer Dings went up into the second story, and told him his orrand and taking him by the arm led him down stairs. As he reached the outer door where the other officers were waiting, he freed himself from the grasp of the officer and run like a door down the street and into the orehard on the Woodbridge farm, pursued by all the

He refusing to stop when ordered to de so, and making the best kind of time, in fact, "rather" better than the officers, they fired as him and at the third shot he halted and surrendered at discretion—nothing was found on his person or in his house. During the day, hewever, he had been seen a Stewart's office, at Bakor's tavern and in other, losslities, which excited suspicious, and led the officers to believe that possibly some of the money might be in his posses-These are all the arrests made. In the

early part of the day considerable money was paid out by Stowart, to sub-agents, who came and went singly or in couples. Two came and received a share, who reside in Indiana and who left the city immediately for that State. The money came earlier than was expected, or there would have been a larger number of receivers in the city and a larger number of arrests made. As it is a pretty tair baul has been made, and all the leaders of the gang. These are all the facts that can at present be given to the public. The matter has been shrewdly and successfully managod, and the entire community have reason to be thankful for their escape from serious loss in taking these dangerous counterfeits. The following is a general de-scription: They are on the 'City Bank of Montreal' and purport to be paid at its branches at Toronto, Three Rivers and Quebec. The vignette at the top and middle of the bill is the Royal Arms of Rugland, the bust of a woman, on the left that of a man in a square medallion. And in this connection is a sure guide for detecting the bad bills. Over and under this medallic. are the words 'Incorporated by Act of Parliament.' Notice that Parliament, when correctly spelled, has an A after "li"—In the counterfeit there is no A, it being carolessly left out. By this means the counterfeits can be readily detected.

The denomination is \$10 paper medium. We caction our readers all over this state, especially in the Northern and interior por-tions of it, not to take any tons on that bank. The public in Indiana and Illinois should beware as it will be circulated there.
