Thank you very much for your letter of the second and for the editorial which appeared in the SPECTATOR of the date March 1st. I cordially agree in your opinion that it will be very difficult to secure National Government at the present time. Mr. King, you will note, has hastened to disassociate himself and the Liberal party from any such suggestion, and last Saturday we had Mr. John Hackett, who represents a Montreal constituency (Conservative) voicing the opinion that the Conservatives would solve our problems, or go down to defeat.

To my mind, it is the power and prestige and privileges enjoyed by professional politicians which make them so prejudiced in their political views.

I have not it in mind to say anything further on this matter for some time. If I did, Hamilton might be a very choice centre in which to make any further statement.
