The French Court feem always to have made North-America an Object of great Attention; and long ago to have formed a Plan, which they have been steadily, tho' slowly, carrying into Execution.

Since the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle they have been more hasty; well knowing of what Advantage it would be to their ambitious Views of universal Monarchy to accomplish it. Their Encroachments have been more numerous, their Hostilities more violent.

In the Province of Nova-Scotia, they have erected a Fort near Bay-Vert; from whence they have a Communication by Water with Louisbourgh, and Canada, and other French Settlements. They have erected another strong one upon the Istmus of the Peninfula, mounted with 26 Cannon, which commands the Basin and Harbour of Chiquesto or Bobaussin; and within very near Cannon-Shot of an inferior one built by the English on the other Side of the Basin. They have seized St. John's River, and crected two Forts there; from one of which they had lately the Infolence to fire upon one of the King's Ships. They have engrossed the whole Furr-Trade of that River to themselves; which, before the late Peace, was wholly carried on by the English.
