CHICAGO. April 24.—Wheat prices mend downward today on account of airly general rains supplementing the nuch needed moisture received durns the previous 24 hours. Selling, lowever, was not all aggressive and he market closed steady at 1-8c to -4c net decline. Other leading staples, so, all showed a setback—corn 3-8c o 3-4c, oats a shade to 1-4c and provisions 5c to 20c. The downpours in the west and southwest resulted immediately in extensive sales of cash wheat to come here from Kansas City. Besides, good authorities were quoted as declaring that abandoned acreage would now be very small and that the government May report must necessarily put the crop condition percentage at unusually high figures.

Weakness in Corn.

Corn went lower in consequence of a falling off in cash demand both east and west. There were resports that the southwest was selling May corn here, and that offerings from Iowa were becoming quite free. It was also said that illinois dealers had evinced more willingness to contract corn for shipment to Chicago.

In the provision pit the offerings from packers and other longs were too heavy to be readily absorbed. Higher prices for hogs failed to act as an off-set.
