## AUSTRIANS ADMIT

## FAILURE OF PLANS

Campaign in Carpathians Undertaken to Relieve Fortress and Army.

## BLAME IT ON WEATHER

Unforeseen Difficulties Interfered Favorable to Russian Commanders.

## GENERAL HEADQUARTERS OF THE AUSTRIAN ARMY

March 25, via Berlin, March 25 and London, 12:45 p.m.—The Austrian general headquarters of the army, which has been in the Carpathians for 14 days, has received a report from its divisions that the Russian offensive has failed.

How it came about that the great fortress was supplied with only this comparatively small amount of provisions is an interesting story.

Przemysl originally was provisioned for the extreme limit, which it was thought a modern fortress, which was capable of withstanding a modern besieging army, namely, about six months. At the end of the first stage of the siege, the garrison had consumed barely one month's supplies.

Then came the heavy fighting between the Austrians and the Russians about Przemysl.

Had to Draw on Supplies.

The Austrian forces, whose supply trains failed to reach them, drew on the fortress for large supplies of rations. Furthermore, the great number of wounded men, who were being sent to the rear, also drew on the supplies of the fortress.

The soldiers stricken down by cholera and other diseases could be sent nowhere else. When railroad communication had been restored in mid-October the stores of the fortress had been largely depleted. The railroad was first used to forward the wounded, and then to forward the supplies.

The Russian steam roller was unexpectedly set in motion again, driving Field Marshal Von Hindenburg west from the neighborhood of Warsaw and the Austrians from Przemysl, provisions had been coming in for the Galicia fortress for only one day. This gave the defenders rations for 80 days.

Russians Relied on Hunger.

The supplies of the fortress, which had been running out, were now exhausted. The Russian forces, who had been relying on hunger to break the fortress, were now forced to rely on their own supplies.

## Jack Welsh Referee

## Johnson-Willard Fight

HAYMA, March 25.—Jack Welsh of San Francisco has been named as referee for the Johnson-Willard fight. He was selected from a list of 14 men.

Harry Sharpe of St. Louis and Mike Walsh of New York were also favored, but Welsh won.

Tom Jones was spokesman for Willard. Johnson was selected for his physical examination by a physician.
