

# "GOLD FILES"

## Heaviness Feature of Dealings In Majority of Mining Issues

### Present Selling of the Low Priced Stocks Has Unsettled the Market for Dividend Payers.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, Jan. 31.

There were no changes in the markets on Cobalt to-day differing from those which have recently been in operation throughout the entire list of low priced shares. The market was heavy, Chambers-Perland sold as low as 1 1/2, Peterson Lake made no recovery from yesterday's decline and Bailey was easier at 5/8.

Nothing new evolved at the McKinley-Darragh annual meeting, but the price for these shares was higher than yesterday's quotations.

Nipissing, Rose and Crown Reserve were quiet with a few fluctuations, and practically no change from yesterday's prices.

Demand was reported at the curb for some unlisted Porcupine shares, which are beginning to attract more attention than Cobalts, and Hollinger held steady. Trehewey was under some pressure and the price fell to 10 1/2 on the afternoon board. Kerr Lake was also lower the inactive. Recent weakness in the low priced issues is having a depressing influence on the dividend stocks, this being the first day such has been noticeable. The market at the close showed no disposition for a change of sentiment, as there appears plenty of the cheaper stocks available at current prices.

McKinley-Darragh Annual.

A satisfactory presentation was presented at the annual meeting of the McKinley-Darragh shareholders yesterday. The gross profits for the year amounted to over \$1,000,000, extensive additions to plant at both McKinley-Darragh and Savage mines have been made and paid for out of the profits, and a liquid surplus of approximately \$500,000 is carried forward. The dividend net profit for the year's operations was \$882,045.55, and the ore reserves are estimated at 6,041,500 ounces as compared with 5,725,000 ounces a year ago.

Lee Claims Sold.

PORCUPINE CITY, Jan. 28.—A claim two miles south of a city near the town known as the Lee property, was sold yesterday by Gordon Benson, agent, to outside buyers, the price not being stated. Option had been taken on the property some weeks ago, and in Lee's opinion the development work showed silver veins widened into real quartz leads.

Just what will be done with the property at this time is not stated.

Coroners Appointed.

Coroners for Porcupine have been appointed, two of them, but so far they have failed to qualify. Drs. McLaren and McIntyre were tendered commissions, but there were no officials to view the remains of the man burned, recently killed at the Norramint mine. The fault of no one in particular, for the appointees do not have to act if they so desire, and the provincial officials have no alternative except to induce some one else to accept the responsible position.

Doctors here are engaged in mine accidents and they could not handle coroner cases.

Answers to Enquirers.

The World office is in receipt of enquiries from the owners of the paper who are anxious to know something specifically on properties located in different sections of the district. Under present conditions it is not always convenient to send answers, but from time to time answers will be given thru the paper without violating confidences.

Mark Township, enquired about, lies north of Murphy, the township adjoining the Tisdale. Engineers state it is within the mineralized zone, but as prospecting has been done in that section, it is too early to say what the district contains.

Murphy Township is heavily timbered with a growth of soft woods, and there is every reason to believe, without referring to the government map, that Mark shares in Murphy's good fortune. The soil is a clay loam.

No one can say that underneath this capping of clay quartz rock does not lie, for no one has made an effort to learn the real condition. At present the township is somewhat out of the working zone.

In Matheson, one township to the east and one tier to the south of Mark, free coal has been located in a small quartz string, which shows that at the least the mineralized zone runs far to the east of Tisdale.

Cripple Creek District.

To the Cripple Creek reader it should be said that the district is north and west from Porcupine, about 20 miles, and while prospecting is going on there at the present time, this district is not far enough advanced to venture upon any definite statement. It was given in a recent interview with Robert Joyce of Hallybury, who has been working in the district. He is favorably inclined towards the mineralized belt, but believes more work should be done before a proper size-up of veins can be made.

The reports of Chairman of the Board Huestis and of Chief Librarian Locke were presented, and both showed many advances. As well as the new system of registration, the opening of the new branches at Riverdale and Deer Park was dwelt upon. The reports also showed a substantial financial balance for the year past. Receipts were \$85,163.77, including \$37,448 in 1910, to \$88,074, and applications to the reference department from 70,801 to 138,751.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been a resident of available Dominion or Alberta lands, Saskatchewan or Alberta, for three years, may apply for a homestead in the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, by the father, mother, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may, within nine miles of his homestead, set a farm at least 20 acres, or a portion thereof, occupied by him or by his mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader's good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead, for \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years. A homesteader of homestead entry (including the land required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may apply for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price of land, \$10.00 per acre. Residence six months in each of three years, cultivation fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
