PROF. GRANT ADDRESSES ONTARIO MEDICAL COUNCIL, AND DEFENDS WORKINGMAN'S BEER

A strong defence of liquor as a beverage was instituted. The workingman should have his beer if he wanted it. It was a well-established fact that alcoholic beverages, such as whiskey or brandy, promote many diseases, and it is not surprising that both sides of the House should be stimulated to prevent the use of alcohol.

"Lager and mild ale are forms of liquid beefsteak which undoubtedly impart power and strength to the system. Why should the poor laboring man who requires a little assistance in this way be deprived of his daily bread in the form of liquid lager?"

Professor Grant also urged greater care and influence created in the sanitation of dairies and meat abattoirs.
