

U. S. DESTROYER SHAW CUT IN TWO BY LINER

Forward Section of Warship Sank
Immediately After Collision
With Aquitania.

New York, Nov. 15.—In the collision between the United States destroyer Shaw and the British liner Aquitania in European waters on Oct. 9, as announced by the navy department two days later, the naval vessel was cut squarely in two 35 feet aft of the bow, and the forward section sank immediately, the other section catching fire, it was learned here today with the arrival of the Melita, carrying 25 survivors of the Shaw.

Other destroyers steamed to the scene, and when they took the burning section in tow the inrush of water quenched the flames. The navy department's announcement said 15 lives were lost. The survivors on the Melita, a Canadian Pacific Line steamer, said the Shaw was one of a number of destroyers conveying a big fleet carrying American troops to an English port.

The fleet was steaming on a zig-zag course. At 5.45 a.m. the steering gear of the Shaw jammed while she was running at a 35-knot speed, and the destroyer failed to answer her helm. Her course was directly across the bow of the oncoming Aquitania, a unit in the fleet. The Aquitania struck the Shaw like a monster knife, the survivors said, passing thru her just forward of the bridge, and not seeming to lose any headway.

Some of those who perished, including one of the officers, were burned to death, and others were drowned when the forward part sank.

GREAT MANIFESTATION TO BE HELD AT PARIS

Paris, Nov. 15.—Next Sunday a great manifestation will be held in honor of Alsace and Lorraine, which promises to be the most important Paris has seen for many years. For the procession more than 200,000 participants have inscribed their names.

The parade will start at 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon from Arc de Triomphe, and will march down the Champs Elysees to the Place de la Concorde, where great platforms have been erected facing the Strasbourg and Lille monuments.

President Poincaré, surrounded by the highest officers of state, will deliver speeches. Ten thousand soldiers will line the roads, and an Alpine battalion, the "blue devils," and one regiment from the front will be stationed in the Place de la Concorde.

Six French bands and one American military band, and the Royal Horse Guards' band will accompany the procession.

Sprigs and pine branches from Alsace and a medal bearing the arms of Metz and Strasbourg will be presented to every member of the procession.

The signal for the start will be fired by a battery of artillery, and airplanes will provide a flying escort.

POPE URGES JUSTICE IN TREATING AUSTRIA

Rome, Nov. 15.—Pope Benedict has written a letter to Cardinal Gasparri, the papal secretary of state, in which the pontiff says:

"We pray that questions between Austria and Italy will receive a solution confirming the just aspirations of the people."

The pontiff's letter continues: "We have given instructions to the Nuncio at Vienna, to put himself in friendly relations with the nations of Austria-Hungary, which are now being constituted into independent states."

"Monseigneur Cerretti, papal under-secretary of state, left tonight for America."

Government to Consider Case Of Conscientious Objectors

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The government will shortly take up consideration of the questions of conscientious objectors under the M. S. A., who are now serving terms of imprisonment. At the same time, consideration will be given to any possible penalty for defaulters. These are said to number some thousands. The suggestion is made that as a penalty they should be disfranchised for a period of years.

EMBARGO IS LIFTED ON DATES OF SAILING

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The chief press censor authorizes the following: The censorship embargo heretofore imposed on the sailing dates and itineraries of merchant vessels is from this date lifted. Shipping news and advertisements may be printed as in peace time, except that, for the present, silence as to war vessels of all kinds, ships under government contract, and munition shipments is requested. Restrictions placed upon statements with reference to battalion numbers and locations of battalions and other units are hereby withdrawn.

Monument to Edith Cavell Will Be Erected in Ottawa

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—A memorial monument to Edith Cavell and the Canadian nurses who were killed by the Germans in raids on Canadian hospitals will be erected in Ottawa in Major Hill Park. The monument will be erected by public subscription and grants from the Dominion. The monument is being executed by Hamilton McCarhy, R.C.A., the well-known Canadian sculptor.

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS EXEMPTED FROM BAN

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The Social Democratic party has been specifically exempted from the ban placed by order-in-council on the I. W. W. and certain other organizations. When the terms of the order were announced, it was stated that it was not intended to apply to the political party known as Social Democratic party but to a society known as the Social Democratic party.

The order, however, itself in the widest scope, causes some doubt whether the political party was included or not. An amending order removes the doubt.

CONGESTION OF CABLES HOLDS UP MESSAGES

New York, Nov. 15.—President Newcomb Carlton of the Western Union Telegraph and Cable Co., said today that his company was temporarily refusing to handle business cables to Europe, owing to accumulated messages which had to be cleared up before new business could be accepted. This delay was likely, however, to be of short duration, he said. The Commercial Cable Company and the French Cable Company were accepting cable messages today, subject to heavy delay.

Judgment has been obtained in the local courthouse by John Lumden, president of the Lumden Lumber Company, Limited, against the Dominion Explosives, Ltd., for \$136,000, one of the largest judgments ever obtained in the local courts.
