YORK RATEPAYERS
DISCUSS HOUSINGCommittee Appointed to Secure
Data Concerning
New Act.

The housing question, township building by-laws, postal facilities, and the taxation of land values were some of the subjects discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Amalgamated Ratepayers' Association of York Township, held at the residence of Mr. E. Corlett, vice-president, in the night.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"That a committee be appointed to consider the housing act and report to the next meeting of the association," said G. T. Williams, the speaker.

The following were appointed to consider the housing act: G. T. Williams, E. Corlett, and J. J. McCarthy.

Mr. McCarthy suggested that the York Township Council should have taken action regarding the housing question some time ago.

If the township adopts the scheme it will help to build up a good solid community," said G. T. Williams. "The purpose is to help the small man to finish or improve his home. It is not a large enterprise, how difficult it has been to secure loans, and this proposition of the government should be taken advantage of."

Mr. Williams, who added that the housing act in its present form does not go far enough, said that the township should be enabled to take full advantage of the scheme.

E. Corlett was of the opinion that the trouble in taking full advantage of the government plan is the inflated price of land held by speculators and building material.

"Taxation of Values. Speculators should be the first move of the authorities," said Mr. Corlett, who pointed out that building is held up to a large extent by sleeping land speculators. "No workman," he claimed, "can carry a lot of \$5,000 at the present time. We must have a bill put thru parliament to compel large land holders to sell their land at an equitable value price of material."

A letter was read from the North Barrie and Parkville Ratepayers' Association, pointing out that a road further north of Morrison avenue thru Prospect Cemetery is required by the residents of that district.

Regarding the York township building by-law, Mr. D. Wood stated that it was workable and satisfactory, and well received by the residents, and compared favorably with the city building by-law, and even in some instances are more stringent.

G. T. Williams agreed, with the exception that the building permit fee for small houses of the plot type should be moved.

Many complaints from delegates in Barrie, Bedford, and other places were recorded regarding the lack of proper postal deliveries.

It was pointed out that if the residents of the districts complained of want of timber their houses and place their names in the value of the city streets, the postal authorities would consider their case.

Bro. Campbell thought it was a matter for the attention of the York Township Council, and not the ratepayers.

The meeting was held at the residence of Mr. J. J. McCarthy, and was attended by Mr. Campbell, Mr. Miller, Mr. Porter and R. D. Wood, senior delegate; Bedford Park, Mr. Thompson, George Green, H. E. Clark, and William Grant; Oakwood, W. J. W. Caswell and G. T. Williams; Barrie, Mr. Macpherson, Mr. E. Corlett, Mr. Whitely, John Shirley and N. R. Joyson.
