Disturbances Recorded at the Observ atory for 3 Hours-Many Lives Lost in Punjab

The earthquake that did such damage at Lahore, India, on Monday, was reorded at the Toronto Observatory An Observatory official says that it was what is known as a globe shaking quake, that is, it was felt all over the globe. The disturbance was reorded at the Toronto Observatory be ginning at 8.14 p.m. on April 3, which would correspond to 6.11 a.m. at La-hore, India. The disturbance continued for three hours, with the maximum in-tensity at 8.52 p.m.

Lahore, Punjab, India, April 5.—The Hill station of Bharmsala was practically razed to the ground by the earth-quakes. The native quarter was entirely obliterated, many of the inhabitants were buried in the ruins. Most of the houses in the European quarters were wrecked and nine persons were killed. The people are sleeping in the open air, food is not procurable and the great distress prevailing is accentuated by keen frost. The entire population is encamped on the adjoining hillsides, without protection and without medical aid. A relief party was despatched from here to Bharmsala today.

70 Natives Killed.

The Europeans killed at Bharmsala were Mrs. Robinson, wife of the colonel commanding the troops there, and her two daughters, Mrs. Holderness, Capt. Muscroft and four members of the Indian civil service.

Seventy natives were killed and many were injured when the native quarter of Lahore was demolished.

The Mohammedans here are parading the streets wailing and praying for deliverance from further visitations. Reports from various points indicate that the earthquakes caused very widespread disaster. The towns of Amritsar, Jultundur, Ferosepore, Multai and Rawal Pindi, as well as Mussooree, were badly shaken and damaged and great damage and loss of life are reported from Kashmir, Dalhousi, Dehradun Patrala and Malerkotle.
