"You'll be protecting your own interest by seeing that the law is en-forced," he concluded Premier Follows Duty.

The premier said it would be un-gracious on his part not to say a word to this large deputation. It must be recognized that the government of the day folloded its duty when it watched for manifestations of public opinion, and so far as public opin-

ion pointed the way it was its duty to follow. He believed that the bill fairly represented the views of a majority of the people of the province; therefore, it was anxious that the bill should pass. The government had been accused deliberately by F. S. Spence, as having for its motive the pleasing of the liquor people. He ap-

prehended that the deputation would not agree as to that. "Our duty is to hold the balance as evenly as possible, and trust to the commendation of the people to tell us

we are right," he said. He agreed with many people as to the evil results of the liquor traffic,

but he believed also that public opin-ion was changing, and that the hotel-keeper was anxious to obey the law. He was entitled to the protection of the law, from the standpoint of fair play and common sense. He was satisfied that by extremists on both sides the government would not be appreci
