



HAMILTON GENERAL NEWS.

H. & B. Will Not Build Weigh Scales Assessment Returns Show Growth. Hamilton, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—General Freight Agent W. N. Warburton of the T., H. & B. has written to Chairman McAndrew of the Markets Committee, stating that the railway will not build weigh scales for the coal dealers near its yards. The city wanted the company to build the scales and had a man ready to drop into the job when completed.

The City is Growing.

Assessment Commissioner Hall handed out to-day the returns of the assessment for 1898. The figures show an increase of \$1,237,530 over those of 1897. The total assessment is \$31,050,630, of which \$26,071,410 is liable to taxation. The real estate assessment of \$22,543,618, shows an increase of \$315,268; the income assessment shows an increase of \$894,862, standing now at \$1,684,512.
