STILL FULL OF FIGHT. RUSSIA BOTTLED UP

The Warlike Spirit in England Has Not Abated.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S SPEECH

Meets With the Full Approval of the Mighty Working Classes.

London Correspondents to New York Papers Comment in an Interesting Way on the Situation as Between Great Britain and the European Powers...

New York, Nov. 20.—Mr. Ford, in cabling to The Tribune from London, comments as follows on Mr. Chamberlain's speeches at Manchester: "England remains in a militant mood, without being exposed to any imminent risk of war..."

"To Mr. Chamberlain's means nothing but unreasoning belligerence and bluster; a less superficial view is that England has begun to realize that sea power, with ships, commerce and colonies and a navy behind them, serves to keep peace and to illumine the course of national destiny..."

Mr. Chamberlain's Expressions. "A fine illustration of the sobering effect of this perception of power and its moral obligation has been offered by Mr. Chamberlain, whose speeches in Manchester have been discussed on the Continent quite as seriously as Lord Salisbury's recent addresses..."

The German estimate of these speeches is more correct than the French. They were plain spoken, but not aggressive; they revealed with admirable lucidity and moderation the real temper of the English people respecting the Nile Valley and the harassing tactics with which the nation had been exposed in many parts of the world in its recent career of overseas expansion...

The only surprise which Mr. Chamberlain had in reserve for his Lancashire audience was the complete revelation of his capacity to discuss all large questions affecting the empire with the judicious gravity of an English Prime Minister, rather than a partisan leader...

NO DECISIVE MOVE YET.

Hemmed in by a Cordon of Other Great Powers.

JAPAN HAS A LARGE SHARE

In the Great Ring Which is About to Be Completed in the East.

A Gentleman Who Goes by the Map Tells How Russia, While Apparently Dominant Just Now in China, is Gradually Being Hemmed in by Great Britain, Germany and Other Powers and Will Be Crushed.

New York, Nov. 20.—Mr. Henry Norman, cabling to The Times from London, gives another solution of the often repeated question, "Why is Great Britain arming at such a rapid rate?" Mr. Norman says: "Mr. Chamberlain's speech at Manchester showed clearly the accuracy of the view that England will require France to evacuate the whole of the Bahr-El-Ghazal provinces, where Commandant Marchand has established seven armed posts and that this constitutes an extremely grave situation between the two countries..."

"The coast guard battleships are mobilized to proceed and cruise around the coast. Port-guard battleships being thus relieved, will reinforce the Mediterranean squadron should occasion arise, so as to enable the channel squadron to return home, which it will do before Christmas, as it is a naval tradition that the channel ships always spend their Christmas holidays at home..."

WELCOME TO OTTAWA DEAD IN HIS 51ST YEAR

Felicitous Address From the Citizens of the Capital

TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL HIS ENERGETIC CAREER.

Countess of Minto Also Included in the Expression of Good-Will.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—Yesterday afternoon Earl and Countess of Minto were formally welcomed to the Capital. Promptly at 12:30 Their Excellencies entered the Council Chamber, accompanied by the Mayor and by Major Gordon, A.D.C. They were escorted to the seats of honor. Ald. Roger, Black, Cliff, Campbell, Davis, Enright, Masson, Silna, Donaldson, James Davidson, Morris, Lapointe, Senator Clemon, Sheriff Sweetland and Colonel Irwin were among those present.

The Mayor wore his robes of office and the civic gold chain, and read the address couched in well-chosen words, and including the Countess of Minto in the welcome and good wishes.

His Excellency's Reply. In reply Lord Minto said: "Mr. Mayor—It is impossible for me to express as I should wish my deep appreciation of the cordiality of the welcome extended to me by the citizens of Ottawa. You have glided so kindly to the period I spent in Canada at a time when Lady Minto and myself were very happy here, that we cannot but feel we have not been forgotten, and that we have in fact come back to a former home."

"I am glad to feel that I return amongst you at a period of prosperity—prosperity not only of a city or of a province, but of many provinces bound together by national ambition, whilst further and the clouds which have dimmed the political horizon of Europe are dispersing. As for our own city, Mr. Mayor, the city of Ottawa, perhaps the changes which have taken place during the last decade impress me more than they do upon those who have been constantly resident amongst you. I recollect Ottawa some 13 years ago, and I come back now to find the population increased by some 15,000—a population I am told far better housed and cared for than it was 13 years ago. I find the city lighted by electricity and an electric street car service, which I believe is without doubt the best on this continent. I find an enormous increase in trade, and I find Ottawa a great railway centre, with the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Canada Atlantic, the Gatineau Valley Railway and the Parry Sound Railway, all centring here."

"But, Mr. Mayor, these are already the achievements of the past; you move quickly here, and one wants to look forward and not to look back, and the future is full of possibilities. Ottawa as a sea port is no wild dream, and you know better than I do what that means, not only for Ottawa, but for Canada. I assure you that during my term of office you need fear no lack of interest on my part in the possibilities of the great future I see before you."

Lord Minto concluded by expressing thanks for the kind welcome extended to Lady Minto. Their Excellencies then left the Council Chamber, and as they did three cheers and a "tiger" were given with good will.

A STORM COMING. Jack Frost Holds Sway in the West and is Moving This Way. A storm of great energy is traveling quickly towards the lake region from the westward, followed by a severe cold wave and fresh to heavy gales are indicated throughout the lake region. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 32-42; Kamloops, 10-16; Edmonton, 14 below-zero; Calgary, 10 below-zero; Qu'Appelle, 10 below-zero; Winnipeg, 14-28; Port Arthur, 38-42; Parry Sound, 38-42; Toronto, 38-46; Ottawa, 38-42; Montreal, 38-38; Quebec, 34-42; Halifax, 40-46.

Probabilities. Lower Lakes and Georgian Bay—Winds, increasing to fresh or strong gales, east and south to-day with mild weather; shifting to west and northwest to-night or early on Tuesday, with a change to decidedly colder; light local snow falls or surries.

Ottawa Valley—Winds shifting to east and west, and increasing to gales; mild to-day and becoming decidedly colder on Tuesday, with west to northwest gales. Lake Superior—Fresh to heavy gales, shifting to west and northwest; turning decidedly colder, with a fall of snow.
