Girls' Shelter, as spokeslady, told of the unfortunate position of girls thrown upon the world of Toronto, triendless and alone. She said that 217 girls between the ages of 16 and 21 had been sheltered last year. For the past years the city had been giving a grant of \$200 annually, but the expenses had been increased three-fold, and they now reluctantly asked an increase to \$500.

The girls, the Mayor was told, paid when they could, when they returned to the Shelter after quitting situations. But His Worship was not the easy victim the ladies had anticipated. He felt that the girls should pay back as much as possible what they had received in their hour of need.
