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IMMORALITY IN NEW YORK

Evidence Before the Industrial Commission in New York Not Compulsory to Police.

TRIBUTE LEVIED BY OFFICERS

And Then the Promoters of Immoral Practices Are Shielded by Them.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Before the Industrial Commission, in session here today, Dr. David Blagden, Superintendent of the Educational Alliance, described the details of Jewish immigration. He took up the question of immorality among the people of the east side of New York, and said that in the past year female immorality had secured a hold in the tenement houses of New York never before known; that children are used as agents for lewd women and that it is impossible to suppress the practice because of corruption in the police force of New York. On account of this condition it had been impossible to get even one case into court.

Police Levy Tribute. The witness said in reply to questions that the police levy tribute upon the persons engaged in the immoral practices; that this levy system extends to the whole police force and that the system keeps generally employed as intermediaries in this system.

Why do you not go to the Chief of Police? he was asked. "He, too, is in the conspiracy," Dr. Blagden said in reply. "He, too, is in the conspiracy."

Worse Than in Europe. Dr. Blagden said that the residents were greatly impressed by this description of the moral conditions in New York, and that they were forming unfavorable opinions of our government. He said that the Jewish immigrant is a man who is not a Jew, but a man who is a man.

A Young Negro Murderer. John Porter, who Killed a White School Girl, is in Danger of Being Lynched. Denver, Nov. 15.—Statements made by John Porter, 15-year-old negro, of Lawrence, Kansas, who yesterday confessed that he murdered Louise Frost, a 11-year-old school girl of Lincoln, Colo., have been confirmed. It has been determined to take Porter to the Hugo Jail. It is probable that Porter's father and brother will also be taken to Hugo.

It is reported today that a dozen armed men from Lincoln are en route to Denver for the purpose of escorting the sheriff and his assistants. A mob of 500 men is said to be forming at Lincoln and Hugo, and a squad of deputy sheriffs were sworn in.

All factories closed at noon, and to prevent further trouble, 100 extra police and a squad of deputy sheriffs were sworn in.

Police Court Record. William Bell of York-street was sent to the Central Prison for six months by Magistrate Dennis yesterday for stealing a pair of barbers' clippers from Louis Boggs.

Michael Burns was remanded till Tuesday on a charge of stealing an overcoat from the property of Edward Granger of East King-street.

Robert Woods, who stole three pairs of gloves from John Hamilton's store, West Queen-street, was given 10 days in jail. Mary Murray of East Toronto was acquitted on a charge of stealing a handbag from the property of Edmund Cassidy, Carleton-street.

George Smith denied stealing his horse, and the charge of cruelty to animals against him was dismissed. Alfred Moses, who is said to have stolen James Chamberlain's wheel, was remanded till Monday.

A week's adjournment was made in the case of Charles Mercer, charged with theft from Mrs. Blight. The charge of illegal liquor selling against James Daly stands off today. Thomas Boylan was fined \$3 and costs 20 days for being drunk and disorderly. James Hoddy, who said he tried to get work and failed, was sent to jail for 30 days as a vagrant.

THE EXHIBITION BUILDINGS

Report of Requirements Adopted at a Special Meeting of the Board.

NEARLY \$200,000 IS ASKED FOR. A Circular Approved That Is to Be Issued to Canadian Architects, Inviting Prize Competitions.

A meeting of the Industrial Exhibition Board was held yesterday afternoon, with President Smith in the chair, the main business being to consider the report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the requirements of the Exhibition. That committee reported as follows:

To the Board of Directors of the Industrial Exhibition Association: Gentlemen,—The Special Committee appointed to consider and report to the board on the requirements of the association with respect to the erection of new buildings, etc., with view to the vote of the citizens being taken thereon, beg to report as follows:

Your committee beg to recommend that application be made to the City Council for the following new buildings and alterations and that the same be submitted to a vote of the citizens at the time of the municipal elections in January next:

New Main Building, 100,000 square feet of floor space, estimated cost, \$125,000. New Art Gallery, 7000 square feet of floor space, estimated cost, \$10,000. Daily Building, 10,000 square feet of floor space, estimated cost, \$14,000. Remodelling Main Building and taking of the tower and spire, estimated cost, \$5,000. Building for storage of exhibits, estimated cost, \$10,000. Remodelling Main Building, estimated cost, \$10,000. Changing Music Pavilion for Women's Building, estimated cost, \$3,000. Enlargement of Postery Building, 1,000 square feet, estimated cost, \$1,000. Enlargement of Fruit and Vegetable Building, 1,000 square feet, estimated cost, \$1,000. New Agricultural Building, 5,000 square feet, estimated cost, \$5,000. New Natural History Building, 7,000 square feet, estimated cost, \$7,000. Architects' fees, estimated cost, \$10,000.

Total, \$197,000. Your committee would also recommend that the board offer prizes for: New Main Building, prize of \$250; Art Gallery, prize of \$50; Dairy Building, prize of \$75; Store Building, prize of \$50; Horticultural Building, prize of \$75; Agricultural Building, prize of \$40; Administration Building, prize of \$50; Natural History Building, prize of \$50; total, \$640.

For all competing plans, open to Canadian architects only, the plans submitted to show floor plans, elevations, sections and perspective views, with synopsis of specifications, showing the material to be used in construction and estimated cost of the buildings, not to exceed the amounts given above. The prizes to be given for one plan for each building only, the designer of the plan selected to get the money prize and the recommendation of the board to the City Council to be given the supervision of the building, the board not guaranteeing that the building will be constructed.

The Board of Directors, or a committee thereof, with two experts, to be the judges of the plans to be awarded the prizes. The other conditions of competition to be substantially those adopted by the Ontario Association of Architects. Speaking of the award of prizes, Dr. Blagden said that the system allows them to observe the best Sabbania and to observe the best Sabbania on this point as a rule, he said.

A Circular to Architects. On motion of Mr. W. K. McNaught, seconded by Mr. W. E. Wellington, after considerable discussion, the report was adopted, and the secretary manager was given instructions to issue the following circular to the architects of Canada, inviting their competition for the specified prizes:

In view of the proposal to submit a bill to the vote of the citizens to provide for the erection of new Exhibition Buildings in the City of Toronto, the Industrial Exhibition Association, Toronto, have decided to offer prizes in a competition open to Canadian architects only, for the best plans for the following buildings:

Ground Floor: Main Building, Space, sq. ft. Cost, \$100,000. 50-Art Gallery, 7,000, 10,000. 50-Dairy Building, 10,000, 14,000. 50-Store Building, 10,000, 10,000. 50-Horticultural Bldg., 12,000, 15,000. 50-Agricultural Bldg., 5,000, 8,000. 50-Administration Bldg., 5,000, 5,000. 50-Natural History Bldg., 7,000, 7,000.

CONDITIONS.—The competition to be open to Canadian architects only. Plans to be sent in to the manager of the Industrial Exhibition Association, Toronto, on or before noon of Thursday, December 20, 1900. The plans to be submitted to show floor plans, elevations, sections and perspective views, and to be accompanied by synopsis of specifications showing the material to be used in construction, and the estimated cost of the same, no plan to exceed the cost given above for the respective buildings. It will be ruled out.

The Board of Directors, or a committee thereof, with two experts to be the judges of the plans to be awarded the prizes. The other conditions of competition to be substantially those adopted by the Ontario Association of Architects.

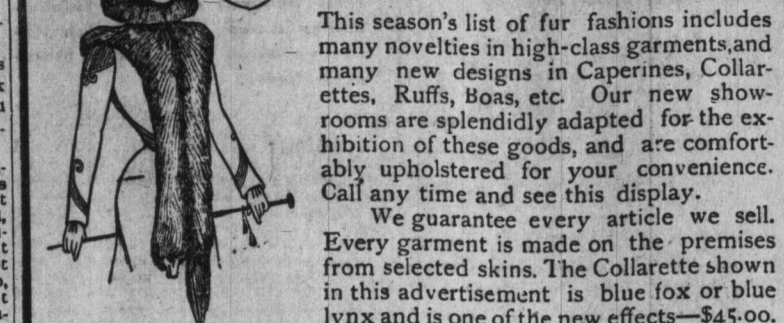
