SITKA'S MAGNETIC OBSERVATORY.

Seattle, Sept. 2.—A despatch from Sitka says that the government will soon commence the construction there of a magnetic observatory for the terrestrial division of the coast survey. The observatory is one of four to be constructed by the government for the purpose of defining the deviation of the magnetic pole. It is known that charts ten or moreyears old are in many cases worthless owing to the deviation of the observatory in marking mariners' courses on the charts.
