## MISER'S GOLDEN HOARD BIG FORTUNE IN HIS ROOM

Had \$56,000 Secreted Under Carpets and Behind Old Pictures.

Paris, April 1.—One of the strangest discoveries of hidden wealth in the history of Paris has just come to light. In December, 1901, M. Narcisse Thibaut, a bachelor of 63, who occupied a room at No. 38, Rue des Boulangers, and never received visitors, was suddenly missed. It was first of all thought that he had gone on a journey, but as time passed and he did not reappear, the concierge became alarmed and informed the landlord, who in turn communicated with the relatives of M. Thibaut.

But it was only some weeks later that the disappearance of the old gentleman was made known to the police, and on Feb. 22, 1902, a magistrate went to the house and opened the door of the apartment. The moment he entered he staggered back in horror; he could hardly believe the sight before his eyes.

M. Thibaut was seated upon an open drawer, which he was clutching with his hands, having been surprised by death in that position. Strange to say, the body was completely mummified, and Dr. Proger, who was called in, said that he had never met a similar case in all his practice. It is known, however, that the deceased lived principally on milk, tea and dry cakes.

The first search made in the room revealed nothing more valuable than piles of empty cigar and cake boxes all carefully numbered. A plank had served the old man as a table. A coffin of the poorest type had already been ordered when the most chance came. A sum of \$56,000 was discovered, and Narcisse was saved from a pauper's burial.

Nothing more was found until a fortnight later, when a more thorough investigation was made, with amazing results. Under the carpet, and hidden behind old pictures were sums amounting to \$8000. Another \$10,000 was revealed on opening an uncut chest. A French translation of "Paradise Lost." Other secret treasuries yielded up their hoards, and the total value computed it was found that the deceased had left not less than \$56,000. M. Thibaut showed considerable originality in his testamentary dispositions. He bequeathed some trifling sums to his niece, and left the residue of his estate to the director of the English society called the "Friends of Peace," which he was a member. Should the bequest not be valid, he selected as his heir a cousin who had, he said, been very kind to him. But this gentleman says the Journal, died a dozen years ago.

## YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

Flood on Humber Washes Away Elliot's Dam at Lambton Mills — Light Station Damaged.

JUNCTION IS IN DARKNESS AGAIN

Temperance People Prepare for Local Option—Consent to Discuss Annexation.

Toronto Junction, April 1.—The Humber played serious joke on the residents of Lambton Mills by going on the rampage to-day. It was thought that most of the ice was out of the river, but a huge field that had evidently been blocked higher up came down with a rush and flooded fifty acres of the Lambton Golf Club grounds. The water backed up for about a mile and was half a mile in width. The bridge on Dundas-street shook like a leaf, and about 30 feet of Elliott's dam was torn away. This dam was built at great expense and is irreparable. Mr. Elliott has decided not to re-build and will in future run the grist mill by steam. Considerable damage has also been done to the Stark T. & F. Company's works.

A petition of the ratepayers, favoring annexation with the City of Toronto, will be presented to the council at its next meeting, when it is likely that a committee from the council, to be appointed to wait on the board of control to learn upon what terms amalgamation is possible.

The temperance people of the town are making preparations for May 1, when the local option, by-law comes into force. A large boarding-house on the street is to be purchased, and an extension built which will accommodate the traveling public.

The Toronto Junction Gun Club held very successful shoot on the Keele-street grounds this afternoon. The Burgess made the top score.

Joseph Strong, for many years a resident of Toronto Junction, died at his home, 149 Pacific-avenue, this afternoon. He leaves a family of grown-up children. The funeral takes place to-morrow to Prospect Cemetery.

Charles Hunter, a young man 26 years of age, employed at the Canadian Foundry, died at his home on Hook-avenue, to-day of apoplexy.

The regular meeting of the town council, which falls on Easter Monday, will be held on Wednesday evening.

On account of the ice on the Humber breaking up against the Stark Electric Company's power house, there were no lights in town to-night. The water is on a level with the fire-box.

The trustees of the public school took advantage of the holiday to-day and inspected the schools.

The Toronto Junction Gun Club held a handicap shoot to-day at fifty targets each. The day was fine, with a strong wind, which made the shooting difficult. Following are the scores: Burgess 43, T. **Death of E. C. Bennett.**  
Edward Bennett, a retired farmer, late of the Township of Markham, died at his home, 187 Jarvis-street, on Friday afternoon. Mr. Bennett resided for many years on lot 35, rear of the 6th concession of Markham, which he owned, and which is now occupied by one of his sons. Mr. Bennett was of quiet retiring disposition, a true friend and good neighbor. High in politics he was a staunch Conservative. He leaves a widow, four sons and two daughters. The funeral will take place from his late residence, 187 Jarvis-street, to Mount Pleasant Cemetery at 2:30 p.m. on Monday next.

**GAMING TABLE TRAGEDY.**  
Judge Who Cheated Ends His Career by Suicide.

Lyons, France, April 1.—M. Weyer, a judge of the court of appeal at Lyons, committed suicide at 3 o'clock yesterday morning by shooting himself through the left eye.

The tragedy has brought to light a remarkable scandal, in which M. Weyer was the central figure. He was a confirmed gambler and was a member of one of the best clubs in Montpellier. Last January he was observed on several occasions while acting in a friendly way as croupier to convert some of the money on the table to his own use.

The player who observed him communicated the matter to the committee, and also it was thought that the accused must have made a mistake, a watch was set on the judge, with the result that he was detected in the act of taking from the table and putting it into his own pocket.

**WANTS HIS FREEDOM.**

Albany, N.Y., April 1.—Al. Adams, who has now been in Sing Sing Prison about a year on an indeterminate sentence with a year's minimum, after conviction under the anti-policy law, has made application to the state parole board to release him on parole, and his case comes up before the board next Tuesday.

**ELEVATOR MEN STRIKE.**  
New York, April 1.—Several hundred members of the elevator contractors' and millwrights' union of New York and Brooklyn went on strike to-day because their demand for an increase of wages from \$4.25 per day to \$5.25 without other concessions was denied.

**GOVE AT LAST.**  
Belgrade, April 1.—The regicide question is considered here to have been finally settled, all those immediately concerned in the palace murders having been removed from the King's entourage.

A decree to-day removes the last two, both favorites of King Peter, being the notorious Col. Popovitch, who becomes commandant of the garrison at Belgrade, and Col. Solovitch, who becomes director of the military academy.

**WILL KILL GOTHAM GAMBLING.**  
New York, April 1.—Gamblers here are in a panic over the outlook for the enactment into law of the bill compelling patrons to give evidence in open court of their winnings and losses at the gaming table.

Under the proposed law, gambling on a large scale as a business will cease in New York City.

Gaming will be without profit, says one in authority, because the merchant or business man who may occasionally visit such places is not likely to court chances of being called upon as a witness.

**COAL FAMINE IN IOWA.**  
Des Moines, Ia., April 1.—Iowa is confronted with a coal famine as a result of the lockout, which has closed every mine in the state and a section of Missouri.

Not a pound of coal is to be had for sale in Des Moines, and other cities of the state are similarly affected.

**Guy Wetmore Carried Dead.**  
New York, April 1.—Guy Wetmore, the author, died in Roosevelt Hospital to-day. He was editor of Munsey's Magazine in 1885 and afterwards Paris representative of Harper & Brothers and foreign correspondent for Munsey's, Outing, Collier's Weekly and other publications. He was born in 1872.

**No Amendment, No Obstruction.**  
Washington, April 1.—In the senate to-day, Mr. Patterson introduced a bill for the amendment of the Chinese exclusion act of 1902.

He said the present treaty between China and the United States would expire Dec. 7 next, and unless the law should be amended, Chinese can come in after that time without obstruction.

Premium Display of American and Empire Tobacco Co.'s a Winner

The sidewalk in front of 167 Yonge-street has been crowded every day this week from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 5 to 7 p.m. This is the store occupied by the premium department of the American and Empire tobacco companies. The firm have had coupons printed in The World for the past week, for which every person presenting one receives a premium. Mr. Smythe, the advertising agent, estimates that between fifteen and twenty thousand people present coupons each day.

A World reporter visited the store last evening and saw the doors opened at 5 o'clock. For one hour a stream of people, young and old, male and female, passed thru the store. Two policemen were on duty at the door, and they were certainly needed, for the crowd began to get impatient. The store is very attractively decorated with various colored electric lights and two large illuminated wheels revolve in the window. Outside a huge snow-shoe attracts attention. It is an enlarged pattern of the snowshoe tag on 700 different articles are displayed, any of which may be obtained by presenting the stated number of tags.

**DEATHS IN N.Y. STATE.**  
Albany, N.Y., April 1.—The bulletin of the state department of health for February shows that there were 12,749 deaths in this state during that period.

"We have no other February mortality which equals this," says the bulletin, and it exceeds by almost 200 the average for the month during the past five years.

Pneumonia was the chief cause with 14.3 per cent. of the total number. Smallpox exists in 47 municipalities in this state at the end of March.
