It was an anxious moment for Odessa, as the squadron of five battleships and seven torpedo boats, with their crews at quarters and their decks cleared for action, steamed within range of the Kniaz Potemkine, the flagship flying signals which read: "Yield or be sunk."

The display of force was too overwhelming for the mutineers, and all thought of resistance was abandoned. Admiral Kruger ordered the Ekaterina II. to place a crew on board the Kniaz Potemkine, and the other vessels of the squadron immediately sailed away.

The mutineers will be transferred to the Ekaterina II., which is now lying alongside the Kniaz Potemkine, and will be taken to Sebastopol.
