Capt. Dreyfus' Counsel Ambushed and Shot.

Dramatic Scenes at the Trial of the Noted Prisoner.

Rioting at Londonderry-Several Persons Injured, Including Eight Constables.

Rennes, Aug. 14.-Two men ambush ed Maitre Labori, counsel for Dreyfus and one shot was fired, hitting Labori in the back. M. Labori fell in the roadway. He is still alive.

Maitre Labori left his house alone for the court at about 6 o'clock this morning. His residence is situated in the suburbs of the town, about a quarter of an hour's walk from the Lycee, the route being along a solitary road beside the River Vilaine. He had reached a point half-way on his journey, when two men, who had evidently been lying in wait for him, rushed out of a narrow lane, and one of 200 Dundas St. Phone 863 them fired a single shot from a revol-

> The murderers were only a couple of yards behind their victim, and the bullet struck Maitre Labori in the back. The wounded man uttered an agonized cry and fell flat on his face. The mur-derers immediately fled through the lane from which they had emerged,

> and both escaped. At 7:30 o'clock it was announced that the bullet had entered the stomach; that there was no outward bleeding, and that the physicians believe that M. Labori will die from the wound.

> DREYFUS FACES MERCIER. Dreyfus listened to Gen. Mercier's pitiless arraignment on Saturday morning until he approached the end of his deposition, with sphinx-like rigdity of features, but watching Mercier like a cat watching a mouse. And when at last his feeling obtained the mastery and he spring to his feet, faced his accuser, man to man, one ap-preciated the depth of his previously suppressed emotions, and Mercler, who

started, had jumped to his feet at the ringing sound of Dreyfus' voice, from the chair in which he was seated while giving his evidence, recoiled from the terrible look Dreyfus threw at him, and stood aghast, wondering whether the prisoner was going to spring upon him. Col. Jouaust and the other members of the court-martial had in the meantime risen and seized the two men, while the court rang with the cheers of the spectators.

Though the general was cheered by

the crowd outside the court, none of them had witnessed the scene in court or listened to Mercier's weak brief. Moreover, the inhabitants of Rennes have always been anti-Dreyfusards. Counter-shouts of "Vive Republique!" and "Vice la Justice!" were raised by those leaving the court room, but the gendarmes quickly cleared the streets on both sides and dispersed the crowd

MERCIER'S LITTLE GAME. At the outset of Gen. Mercler's testimony he prepared the court for a war scare, by declaring that the Emperor of Germany personally took an active part in organizing espionage, and then later, when he defended his action in communicating the secret dossier to the court-martial of 1894, he said: "I no longer had reason to keep silent, and am going to accomplish what I considered my duty. In 1894 the diplomatic situation was perilous. M. Hanotaux (then minister of foreign affairs) has indicated this. M. Casimir-Perier has spoken before the criminal chamber about the unusual steps taken by Count Von Munster. He also exposed the somewhat unusual way that he could double himself into an official personage and a private personage, later giving Count Von Munster information, which was at first refused him But M. Casimir-Perier amended his deposition, saying he had not said that the same day he, M. Dupuy and myself remained from 8 in the evening to 11:30 in his private office at the Elysee. awaiting the result of telegraphic communications between the emperor of Germany and Count Von Munster. We remained four hours and a half waiting to see whether peace or war would result from this exchange of

As a Result of the West India Hurricane-300 Bodies Buried in One Place.

Ponce, Porto Rico, Aug. 14.-The terrific wind which accompanied the recent storm destroyed the crops and demolished many houses on the higher ground, while the floods destroyed brodges and houses and caused a great loss of human life. A large number of cattle were killed. The loss was most severe in the central part of the island and along the southern coast. Three hundred bodies have been buried in the city of Ponce, and it is estimated that 2,000 persons were drowned in the Ponce district.

During the progress of the storm the municipal hospital was wrecked and its patients were removed to the military, hospital.

VILLAGES WIPED OUT.

Yabucoa, Adjuntas and Humacao were devastated, and in some instances entire villages were swept out of ex-One hundred persons are reported to have been killed on a coffee plantation. Everybody is ruined. Pestilence threatens and money and work are needed. A newspaper appeal has been made to the American people for relief. The calamity, with the commercial depression, has pro-

duced a terrible condition of affairs.

According to an official report received here the port of Arecibo was destroyed, the place being inundated by water from the ocean and the river. Two hundred bodies are in the morgue there, and hundreds of persons are missing. A number of wealthy citiz-ens who lived on plantations in the

suburbs were drowned.

According to late reports from Yabucoa 80 bodies were buried there on Wednesday, while the remains of 200 victims have not been recovered.
