city and county of Middlesex of a hospital for consumptives.

The clause adopted does not finally settle the matter, but it advances the negotiations a considerable stage. The clause read as follows:

"Your committee beg to submit herewith a proposed agreement between the city of London and the county of Middlesex, re hospital for consumptives, recommending same for adoption as a basis for further negotiation between the city, the county and the Provincial Government, and your committee further recommend that they be given power to arrange with the county for taking a vote of the ratepayers at the next municipal election or obtain special legislation confirming the said agreement at the next session of the Ontario Legislature, providing always that reports be made from time to time by your committee to the council of such steps as may be taken by your committee."

Asphalt Repairs.

Asphalt repairs again gave the council trouble.

Ald. Garratt, seconded by Ald. Gillen, moved that no repairs be made this year, as to spend the sum of \$2,500 on the pavement now would only mean to throw the money away.

When it was explained that No. 2 committee has made arrangements to have the repairs made, the mayor ruled the motion out of order.

Mr. Pearce Will Go.

Parks Commissioner Pearce was granted ten days' leave of absence to visit Chicago as the representative of the London Playgrounds Association, when the convention of American Playgrounds Associations meets there.

Ald. Gillen made the motion to send Mr. Pearce to Chicago, and Ald. Scarlett seconded it. This was a direct slap at the board of works, which at its last meeting had refused to allow Mr. Pearce leave of absence, even though the local playgrounds association had offered to pay his expenses.

The members of the board of works opposed the proposal, but Ald. Stevely declared that it was "small potatoes" to refuse Mr. Pearce a holiday, when all other civic employees are given holidays during the year.

Ald. Gillen's motion was to give Mr. Pearce two weeks' holiday, but on motion of Ald. Matthews it was made to read "ten days' leave of absence." Mr. Pearce to be allowed to go anywhere he desires—Chicago or anywhere else.

Dr. J. S. Niven, M. B., was appointed for a three-year term on the board of health, to succeed Dr. English, who resigned to go to Hamilton.

Blocking Niagara Power Line.

Mayor Judd informed the council that owing to the fact that the application of the Toronto and Niagara Power Company for permission to construct a transmission line and electric railway from Brantford to London had been held up by the city of London, and that it will come up for hearing again at Ottawa before the deputy minister of railways and canals on June 27.

According to a statement made in a recent letter to the mayor, the deputy minister was favorable to the granting of the franchise, despite the opposition of the representatives of the Western Ontario Municipalities Niagara Power Union, and it was only because London's views on the subject had not been learned that an adjournment until the 27th inst was agreed to.

A map of the proposed route of the transmission line showed that it does not enter the city of London, but stops at the outskirts.

City Should Be Protected.

The mayor gave it as his opinion that before the route is approved of by the department of railways and canals a clause should be inserted in the charter making the company subject to such conditions as the council of the city of London shall see fit to impose, at any time the company attempts to go through London.

The action of the mayor, who has been acting in the matter, was approved.

of July 14, 1902, and nine months passed before it was decided to rebuild it on an agreement reached as to the materials to be used. The foundation stone of the new structure was laid with pomp and ceremony on April 25, 1903.

The new Campanile stands on the same foundations as the old, formed, as known to the people, into the mud, producing a solid platform, strengthened by over 3,000 new piles of larch wood and calculated to support a weight of 90,000 tons, while the Campanile, when completed, will not, it is believed, weigh more than 20,000 tons.

The expense up to the present work amounts to \$25,000.

Not only the greatest care is taken to reproduce the old bell tower in its minutest details, but some parts which remain of it will again be put in place, for instance, the angel which stood on the summit and the dragon, the famous bell which the Venetians brought from Crete.
