PHONETIC SPELLING

Mr. Roosevelt Orders It To Be Used in Various Govt. Departments.

Washington, Aug. 28. — The President's order regarding phonetic spelling will be extended to all parts of the United States Government. By his direction all public documents are to be printed with that form of spelling. A meeting was held yesterday, called by Public Printer Stillings, of all the chief clerks of the various departments, and a committee was appointed to formulate rules for carrying out this order. The committee will report at a further meeting.

DIES OF GRIEF FOR DOG

Virginia Woman's Heart Breaks When Her Pet Is Lost.

Norfolk, Aug. 28. — From grieving over her pet dog, Mrs. A. L. Huntley, a wealthy woman of Lamberts Point, is dead. Several months ago Mrs. Huntley lost her St. Bernard, which was a great pet of hers. She inserted an advertisement in the local papers offering a reward for the animal, dead or alive. The picture of the canine appeared in the advertisements. The dog failed to return, and Mrs. Huntley, from constant worry, died. Today a negro found the dog on the Sewell's Point road. The animal had no tag on it, and a policeman, not knowing to whom it belonged, killed it.

CALF SUCKS SNAKE VENOM

Man Bitten by Rattler Puts Finger in Bossy's Mouth—Animal Is Dead.

Thurmond, W. Va., Aug. 28. — When gathering huckleberries at the headwaters of Potter's Creek, Belme McCormick was bitten by a rattlesnake, the reptile sinking its fangs into his finger and hanging on until shaken off.

In a near-by field were two calves attempting to feed from a cow. Thoroughly frightened, McCormick leaped the fence, caught one of the calves, and placed the bitten finger in the animal's mouth. The calf immediately began sucking furiously on McCormick's poison-filled digit, drawing all the venom into its own system. McCormick has suffered but little from the effects of the bite, but the calf is dead.

ENGLAND PLAGUED BY HEAT AND ANTS

Suffers from Brief Wave of High Temperature and Rushes for Cooling Beverages.

London, Aug. 28. — The vagaries of the weather formed a fruitful topic of conversation in London last week, and, following the South American earthquake, have suggested to many minds a relationship of cause and effect.

For several days the temperature had been slowly rising, and the climax was reached on Wednesday, when the mercury went up with a jump to 87 degrees Fahrenheit in the shade, and achieved a record for this year.

Shopkeepers, particularly clothing and caterers, were quite taken by surprise by this heat wave. A legend displayed in tailors' establishments in the west end, "New Winter Goods Now in Stock," had a queer exasperating effect, and created in one an unholy desire to smash the shop windows. An abnormal demand was experienced for cooling drinks, and in many cafes and clubs the supply gave out at an early hour. The temperature came down with a mighty rush Thursday afternoon and Londoners were no longer troubled to devise schemes for keeping cool.

One remarkable phenomenon is reported. At Sandwich, what is described as resembling a black thundercloud advanced out of a fog which veiled the sea on Tuesday afternoon, and, crossing the sand hills, spread over the town and then descended. The cloud proved to consist of millions of winged ants. Pedestrians covered their heads with handkerchiefs and fled precipitately into shops and houses, while thousands of insects covered horses and vehicles in the streets. The River Stour was covered with a thick black layer. Later the visitation continued toward Deal and Ramsgate.

London is suffering from a plague of mosquitoes, and from Haresden, in the north, to Wimbledon, in the south, there are complaints of their ravages. Physicians in all parts have been consulted by persons suffering from septic poisoning set up by bites.

South Kensington's residents, who have suffered especially, suggested that the pest had been imported in cases arriving at the museum from various parts of the globe, but entomologists discredit the theory. According to one authority there are 25 known species of the family which can live in the British climate, and some have the disagreeable characteristics of the foreign mosquito.

STRUGGLE WITH THE WASP WAIST

Decry Fashion in London That Makes It Necessary and Then Hasten to Cultivate It.

London, Aug. 28. — The wasp waist is pushing its way into favor again, despite the fact that it is regarded by the majority of women with distrust. Fashion's decrees must be obeyed, however, and many women who are most emphatic in deploring the necessity of the wasp waist suffer much in their efforts to obtain one for themselves.

One well-known corsetiere says she always advises her customers to avoid tight lacing as it ruins the figure and shortens life. She contends it is a mistake to imagine that a man admires a tiny waist, as what he admires is a trim and rounded waist, which is easily cultivated "without discomfort, or cramping the body into corsets which resemble mail armor."

On the other hand, a west end costumier says the wasp waist need not be a result of tight lacing, and guarantees to give her customers a wasp waist without discomfort. Her secret is that she studies her customers. If a woman complains about the size of her waist she does not recommend tight lacing, but designs a gown which emphasizes the shoulders and hips and makes the waist in comparison appear a couple of inches smaller.

One physician, who was consulted on the subject, declared that he had issued warnings without end against tight lacing, and that at last he had given it up in despair. He could only offer this promise to a girl who was tightly laced: "If you will suffer from wrinkles around the eyes, purple cheeks, chafed hands, broken veins in her nose, a worried expression, and, finally, gray hairs from malnutrition."

ACCUSED OF GRAFT

A Parisian Minister Mixed Up in a Colonial Scandal.

Berlin, Aug. 28. — The coils of public censure in connection with the graft scandal in the colonial department are tightening around Gen. Von Podbielski, the Prussian minister of agriculture. His wife's heavy financial interest in the firm of Tippelskirch & Co., accused of corrupting Major Fischer, and the consequent supposition that he must have had knowledge of that officer's relation with the firm, excite increasing disapproval.

A well-informed news agency announces that the minister's resignation may soon be laid in the hands of Kaiser, who tolerates no nonsense in anything affecting the army.

The latest development affecting Herr Podbielski is the revelation that while he was postmaster-general in Germany a few years ago, Tippelskirch & Co. were in the Government two floors of their new building in Klauhaus for postoffice purposes, the payment being so exorbitant that a few years' rental would have sufficed for the construction of a whole new building.

WAITERS MIGRATE FOR LACK OF TIPS

Resorts in England Unable to Obtain Men Because They Go to the Continent.

London, Aug. 28. — The close of the London season has brought about a dearth of waiters, and the chief waiting employment agencies are receiving dozens of applications which they are unable to meet. It is computed that every summer some five thousand "knights of the napkin" leave London for the continent and English seaside places. This year, however, a greater number than usual has gone away, says R. Kipfer, secretary of the London branch of the Union Helvetia, which in other words is the Swiss hotel employees' society, in explaining the cause of this migration, threw light on the tipping question. One reason is an increasing continental demand for waiters who speak English. But the most important reason "lies in the fact that London waiters find it a difficult matter to make a decent living in hotels and boarding houses on the English coasts. Englishmen who tip freely when abroad will, when in their own country, regard a hotel employee a sixpence or a shilling for two weeks' incessant attention. In consequence, fewer waiters have this year accepted engagements at these places."

Another feature of the tipping question mentioned by Mr. Kipfer was that in many seaside hotels the head waiter presents the bills to patrons and pockets all tips, with the result that an ordinary waiter finds it difficult to earn living wages.

THE KILLING OF DYNES

Jealousy May Have Prompted Murder of Young Windsorite.

Windsor, Aug. 28. — Albert Dynes, father of Lloyd Dynes, the Windsor telegraphist who was found murdered in the Michigan Central office at Gallien, Mich., arrived here with the body today.

No definite clue has been found by the authorities investigating the matter at Gallien, but it is the general belief that Dynes was killed by some one who was jealous of him because of his popularity among women. There may be developments along this line.

Another theory, but one not widely accepted, is that he was killed by persons who intended to rob the station, but were frightened away by an approaching train before they got any valuables.

ALFONSO EATS RAILROAD GREENS

Signalmen Who Wash Track-Grown Vegetables Send Him Hamper a Day.

Paris, Aug. 28. — The private table of King Alfonso of Spain is served with vegetables grown in the smoke of a Paris railroad line. It happened that when King Alfonso made his first visit to Paris he noticed from the window a small triangle between the signal-box and the line, every inch of which was made to grow lettuce, cabbages, onions, etc., which flourished exceedingly, and, as he said, looked as if they were watered by hand between each smoke-vomiting express. He commented on the garden at President Loubet's table, and the president said he, too, was interested, and had learned that the two signalmen actually did sponge every leaf thrice a day. The king, in a burst of enthusiasm, paid a visit to the signalmen, and has since evidently talked the matter over with the queen, for an order has come from Madrid that the two brave railroad porters pack every day a hamper of their produce to the king's table.

King Alfonso has apparently influenced King Carlos of Portugal to sympathy for the same honest employees for Lisbon is to have another daily hamper, and the signalmen have awakened to find themselves famous.

French Count Entertained His Friends Below the Seine.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Society in this city has just awakened to the fact that one of its leaders has completed a magnificent and costly mansion under the River Seine, where one can enjoy the most delicious coolness these torrid days. Count Victor de Lamoignon, the proprietor of the novel mansion, which he had built secretly between Melun and Sens, in order to surprise his friends.

A few days ago he sent out invitations and automobiles to convey every one to the strange habitation, and on arrival every one was surprised to find a most luxurious abode under the water. The entrance is through a grotto on the river embankment, and adorned with many statues. An elevator takes the guests below the level of the river, and then an entrance is made to a magnificent reception room in the center of which a marble fountain adds to the coolness of the surroundings.

A complete dining-room, library, bedroom and kitchen constitute the four apartments of the novel house. The count is besieged with requests for invitations to visit his abode under water, and it is probable he will remain here all through the summer, as no where, even at the seashore, can he meet with the comforts and coolness which he finds under the Seine.

PIRATE'S HOARD

English Expedition to Search for It in the Caribbean Sea.

Liverpool, Aug. 28. — Wm. H. Small, of Liverpool, the owner and master of the ketch Catherine, which has been fitted for a voyage to the Caribbean Sea in search of treasure, and which is under detention by the customs authorities at Douglas because of lack of the ship's papers, has made an interesting statement regarding his intentions.

The concealed hoard, he says, was buried by Latrobe, a notorious French pirate, about the year 1808, on an island, and consists of specie and jewelry of the estimated value of \$5,000,000.

The secret of the hiding-place was revealed by an old sailor while on his deathbed 28 years ago, to a ship's doctor named Davidson. This sailor, while serving on a merchant ship, was made a prisoner by Latrobe, and to escape death joined the pirate crew. While making for the pirate headquarters they were chased by an American corvette, but escaped, and buried their treasure in boxes on the island.

When the pirates again put to sea they were attacked by an American ship, most of them being killed, and the remainder being captured.
