

SCORES TRYING PHYSICAL TEST OF DRAFT ARMY

Applicants Line Armories Today and On Saturday, Awaiting Examination.

EIGHT MEN SIGNED UP That Many Joined Colors Overseas Units.

Lines of applicants at the armories today and returns for Saturday, which show that twenty civilians came before a medical board to discover whether or not they were eligible for service in the draft army, testifying to the willingness of men liable for service under the military service act to learn whether they are fit and desirous of the work which the calling up of the first draft will entail.

Only five of the twenty men who were examined on Saturday were placed in class "A2," which indicates fitness to serve with a combatant unit.
