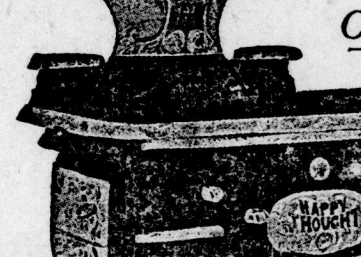

The receipts during the year came from the following sources: Balance on hand, \$219.37; teas, \$446.42; fees, \$10.25; monthly collections, \$1,019.15; donations, \$14.00; interest, \$11.25; Girls' Auxiliary, \$435; county grant, \$194.73; town grant, \$150; French Red Cross, \$225.81; total, \$2,889.68.
