A LIVE SUGGESTION

The practicability and sound sense of the proposal contained in the mayoralty platform of Ald. E. S. Little, that London can now move to secure a new union depot and track elevation, were established yesterday in an interview given out here by W. D. Robb, vice-president of the Grand Trunk Railway

Mr. Little, who has given the subject much thought, and who has maintained close touch with the situation since the summer of 1916, is advised that the nationalization of the Grand Trunk has furnished London with her long-awaited opportunity.

His plan, which he intends to put into effect in the event of his election, is to proceed to secure action not through the railway authorities, buf through the Dominion Government. In the past the Grand Trunk has been a bankrupt private company, but it is now the property of the people of Canada, and the people of London are accordingly in a position to go direct to the capital with a demand for the improvements, in the interests of public service and safety.

Vice-President Robo of the Grand Trunk, in his interview here yesterday gave the weight of his authoritative opinion That the matter is now one for Ottawa to deal with.

London should therefore proceed as quickly as possible to give effect to Ald. Little's suggestion, and, inasmuch as he is the man who has developed this phase of a most important issue, it is fitting and logical that he, as mayor, should be deputed to see the scheme carried through to successful fruition

Though it is true that London's interests could be advanced in many ways, there is perhaps no avenue of endeavor which will have a more important bearing on the city's future than the campaign for a union depot and track elevation. The horrible loss of life and great suffering caused by the frequent level crossing accidents are but a phase of the grade-crossing nuisance. Workers are constantly subjected to irritating and often costly delays by shunting trains; street railway service is disrupted and property values beyond the crossings are adversely influenced. With a series of viaduets separating grades at every street in London from the Thames River through to Egerton street, London would be rid of the crossing menace, annoying and inconvenient delays would be eliminated, and property values in the whole southern area of the city would be stimulated.

The Grand Trunk carshops, together with the proposed reclamation yards, may be moved from London next year if the city council does not take prompt action to close Wilton avenue and turn over to the Grand Trunk. This would mean that at least four hundred work-men would be lost to the city. A request to close this street has been The street parallels the Grand Trunk tracks between Egerton street and Highbury avenue, and the railroad owns

The street parallels the Grand Trunk tracks between Egerton street and Highbury avenue, and the railroad owns the property each side of it. The company wants the street closed so that it can use the whole property as reclamation yards. It claims that this cannot be done if the property is cut up the centre by the street.

Must Adjoin Carshops.

The Grand Trunk carshops are immediately east of Egerton street, and Wilfon avenue is west of it. The company claims that its reclamation yards must adjoin the carshops, and that if the city blocks this by refusing to close the street, it may become necessary to move both the carshops and the reclamation yards out of the city. About 250 men are employed in the carshops, and that London would thereefore lose about 400 men if the move was made.

It is claimed that when a railroad owns property on both sides of a street, as in this case, that it can have it closed by making application to a county judge. It is asserted that the company thought this course would unnecessarily antagonize the city council, and therefore made application, as a matter of courtesy, to that body to close the street.
