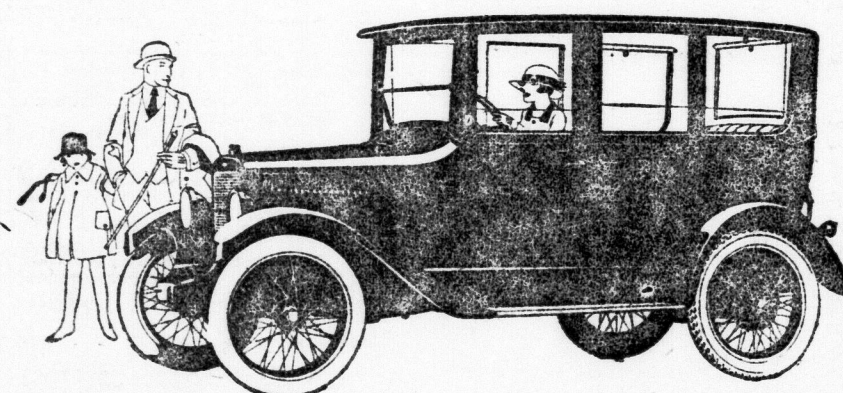

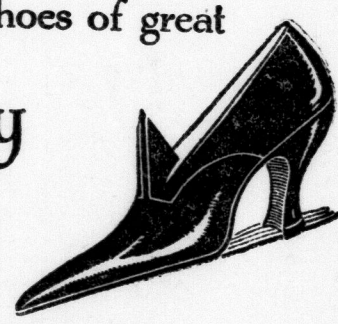

BRANCH OF DRAMA LEAGUE MAY BE FORMED IN LONDON

Women's Press Club Will Meet To Discuss Question.

In view of the fact that a branch of the Drama League will probably be formed in the city at a meeting called by the Women's Press Club for Wednesday evening next at the Institute of Musical Art, it is interesting to note what the Drama League of America really stands for. A feature of the Wednesday night meeting will be a dramatic reading of Galsworthy's "Justice" by Catherine McCormick-Drickenden and S. C. Stevens.

The constitution of the Drama League of America states its aim briefly as follows: "To crowd out vicious plays by attending and commending good plays and building up audiences for them through study classes, reading circles and lectures; to aid in the restoration of the drama to its honorable place as the most comprehensive, most democratic medium for the self-expression of the people."

The Ottawa Citizen, in commenting on this statement in connection with a branch of the Drama League in that city, goes on to say: "It will be seen therefore, that the Drama League is not a dramatic club, although the study, rehearsal and presentation of good plays is a logical development of the main idea."

"Such an organization as the Drama League is absolutely supported, should achieve the following results in the community:

"1. Enable those who desire to study the art of the theatre an opportunity to do so with the same facility as those who devote themselves to literature, painting or music.
"2. Exert sufficient influence to prevent the exhibition of our natural taste for theatrical entertainment by second and third rate companies.
"3. Provide assurance that box-office support will justify the appearance here of the best theatrical offerings which in the past have been apt to pass us up.
"4. Supply entertainment of such excellence that the word 'amateur' shall become an adjective in the future, as it has been a noun in the past."

STRIKE NOT SETTLED

Chairman of Painters' Local Denies Report.

C. Garlick, chairman of the local Painters' Union, last night emphatically denied the report made in a local newspaper that the strike of painters in the city had been settled. He said the facts were that two firms had signed up with the men, that sixty-five of the painters were working on their own, and that the remainder, numbering only four, were out of employment.
