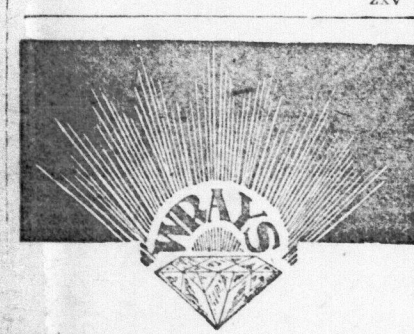

RETURNED SOLDIER SAVED FROM LAKE BY LONDON NURSE

Miss Daisy Thomson Goes To Man's Rescue in Uniform.

FATALITY AVERTED

Brave Nurse Already Holds Medal For Life-Saving.

PORT STANLEY, Aug. 22.—Plunging into the lake this afternoon with her clothes on, Nursing Sister Daisy Thomson of London, who is in charge of the hospital tent at the Soldiers' Aid Commission Camp, saved the life of a returned soldier who got into serious difficulties when he got out of his depth while swimming.

The man, who is still under medical treatment, was visiting his wife at the camp, and shortly before 4 p.m. thought

A swim in the lake would be a pleasant change from heat and dust of the city. The storm of Friday night had considerably altered the beach at spots, and the man apparently got into a hole and was immediately in difficulties. The alarm was given at once, and Miss Thomson, without waiting to divest herself of her uniform immediately went to his rescue and succeeded in bringing him to shore in a state of collapse.

He was immediately taken to the camp hospital tent and "strapped" by Miss Thomson before she gave a thought to the discomfort of her own wet garments, and after a rest in bed was soon little the worse for his experience. Miss Daisy Thomson is a member of No. 4 Nursing Division, St. John Ambulance Brigade, London, and saw service overseas as a V.A.D. She is also the holder of the Royal Humane Society's life-saving medal, which she won in England, and of a gold medal for swimming.

A SCHOOL OF STRENGTH AND CHARACTER.

September Departmental and Matriculation Examinations

Beginning September 7th next the Department of Education and the Matriculation Board of Ontario will hold supplemental examinations at the four Universities of the Province: Western University is the examination centre for this district. At these examinations opportunity will be given not only, as in the past, for those who failed in some papers of the Pass Junior Matriculation, but also for those who failed in portions of the Middle School Upper School, or Honor Matriculation, to write off the failures according to the timetable below.

All candidates who wish to write should, before September 1, notify the Department of Education, Toronto, of their intention, and with this application send to the Department the fees, which are as follows: Middle School and Pass Matriculation examinations, \$3 for each paper, with a maximum fee of \$15; Upper School and Honor Matriculation examinations, \$4 for each paper, with a maximum fee of \$20. A penalty will be exacted for applications received after September 1. Forms for application may be obtained directly from the Department of Education, or in this district from Dr. Neville, the Registrar of Western University.

All examination books and paper will be provided by the Department of Education, but pen, ink, mathematical instruments, etc., must be furnished by the individual candidates.

BEEF, IRON AND WINE CLAIMED TO BE LIQUOR

Middlemiss Merchant Sells It, Is Charged, Under O. T. A.—Fight Likely.

A unique case, and one on which the decision will be taken through-out Ontario courts as a precedent, was heard before Squire W. H. Chittick and a jury at the county court here Saturday afternoon, when John McDonald, a merchant of Middlemiss, was charged with selling intoxicating liquor containing more than two and a half per cent spirits, to wit, six bottles of beef, iron and wine, accused through his counsel, W. R. Meredith, pleaded not guilty, and maintained that the liquid was a proprietary medicine. Decision of the court was reserved one week.

James Waddilove, an Indian resident of the Muncey reserve, swore that on July 23 last he purchased six bottles of beef, iron and wine from McDonald, accused at \$1 per bottle, three of which were bought from a 10-year-old son of accused. He used the product in one day, as the result of which he became intoxicated. He admitted that he had purchased it before, and that he did not inform the accused that he was obtaining same for beverages purposes. License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside testified that he obtained a bottle of beef, iron and wine from Thomas McDonald, Indian agent of Carleton Place, and that analysis of same showed it to contain 33.17 per cent proof spirits and 15.29 per cent absolute alcohol by weight. McDonald informed the court that the fluid analyzed was obtained at defendant's store.

John McDonald, on trial as charged, swore that the beef, iron and wine was kept as a medicine, and was put up by a widely known Canadian medical firm. "It contains sufficient medication to prevent its use as an alcoholic beverage," he declared, and produced "The National Pharmacy" an authority on the subject to prove his statement. "It is a patent proprietary medicine," said W. R. Meredith, conducting the defence, "and it makes no difference whether it is intoxicating or not." The prosecution would not admit this view, and the decision rests with the court, and the crown maintaining that as the fluid is intoxicating McDonald is liable to the penalties provided under the Ontario temperance act. As beef iron and wine is widely sold throughout the province by druggists and merchants the Middlemiss case is regarded as a test one, and if a conviction is registered by the court many more prosecutions will follow in this district. The manufacturers who enjoy an enormous trade in beef, iron and wine sales may appeal the conviction (if such is registered), and the case may be taken to higher courts as a precedent.

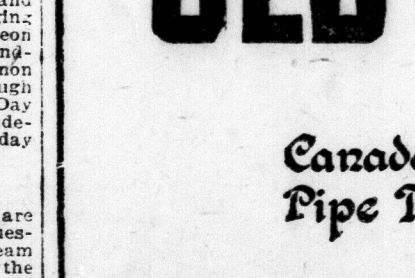

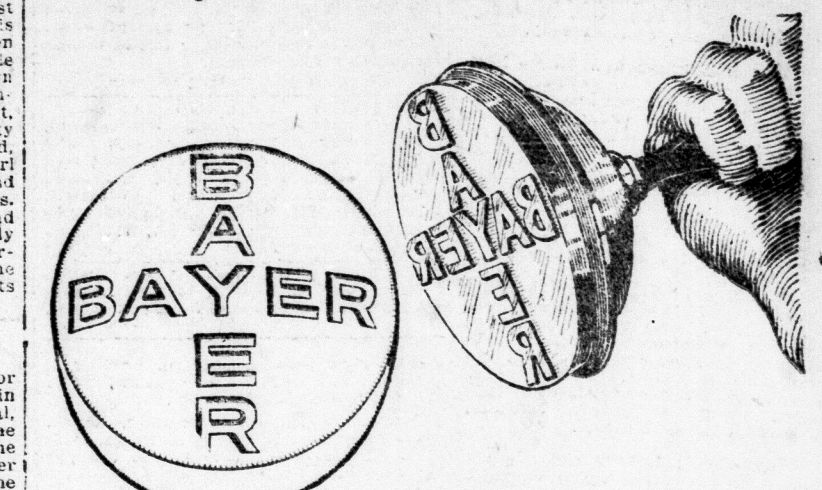
