**NO WORK AND NO HOMES
FLOODING THE REFUGES**
Various Charitable Institutions Report Unprecedented Demand
—Worse Than Year Ago.

The increasing seriousness of the problem of the unemployed is made evident by the reports of the various charitable institutions of the city. The situation is becoming more acute daily. There are strenuous days at the house of industry. The institution, which last month completed its seventeenth year of usefulness, has, perhaps, never before in its history, and certainly not in recent years, had so many applicants for aid to deal with.

There were about 200 applications for work made at the British Welfare League yesterday. "From morning till night they kept up the invasion of the front-street offices, and in most cases were advised to apply to the city or to the government authorities. About 100 more British immigrants have arrived during the past few days and been given sleeping accommodation."
