John M. Raftery, special correspondent of The Chicago Tribune, writes from Montreal as follows:

From Montreal, the busiest, the most populous, and in every way the most if uncertail city in the Dominion of Canada, it is well to write a letter bearing closely upon the fact that the tariff wall between the United States and Canada is the corner stone of the recent growth, expansion, and prosperity of manufacturing industries in this part of the country.

In seven years more than \$20,000,000 of American money has been invested at Montreal, in factories. An equal sum of Canadigum money has been put into enterprises

Are Doing Well Enough.

Now, you go to the Montreal manafacturer and ask him what sort of international arrangement he wants and he will tell you that he is doing well enough, thank you. The chances are nine to ten that you will find an American manager, or an American from Proponderance of Skilled laborers from the United States. Here now are money, brains, labor—all inducted from Uncle Sam's domain to develop and realize upon the resources of Canada and induced to come here by what? The desire, and, perhaps, the necessity to evade the fariff wall which separates the two ountries.

It is fit here and now to say judiciously that the advent of American money, American ingenuity, and American industry is decing more than anything else to reconcile Canada, and especially Quebec Province to the restrictive conditions of the tariffs of the two countries.

Keen for Foreign Capital.

The province of Quebec, Montreal especially, is keen for the induction of foreign rapital. Nothing could have better noariable requisites of our international trade relations, becomes at once a friend of the prohibitive American inpost on stuffs made in Canada. Within seven years a total of nearly \$50,000,000 has been invested in manufacturing businesses here to the end that this province and its tributary territory is no longer dependent upon or subservient to American factories in the lines included.

In Montreal, if anywhere in Canada, you will find that the Dominion manufacturer is pleased with the stariff obstruction that the public dislikes. One-half the factories of this great city of half a million to looking for the initial cause of the happy cenditions, they say: "It is the tariff."

Not All Friedly to Embargo. the public dislikes. One-half the fac-the public dislikes. One-half the fac-tories of this great city of half a milition population are of American origin, ener-gized chiefly by American money and de-voted to nothing but the "main chance."

The Canadian capitalists associated with these American born industries are inno-cent of all sentiment. American models, American methods, American policies are used here to the end that Monitral threatens to become the fountain head and focal point of Canadian manufacturing in-questries. which, to an American, does not present itself in any of the maritime provinces:
Visiting to-day, say fifty of the manufacturers and jobbers of Montreal, I find the former uniformly favorable to the existing tariff embargoes. What could be more logical, or, for that matter, more selfish? But with the jobber, the wholesale, it is different. He would like to nave an open market. He wants reciprocity, and he is in the majority, of course. He would wish to buy in New York, in Boston, in Chicago, in open competition for low prices and equal values if there were no intervening tariff.

The consumer, more numerous still, also wants his wares at the lowest price consistent with staple values. So that the retail dealer, the jobber, and the consumer of Montreal and Quebec are, for selfsh out sequential reasons, favorable to reciprocity with the States.

But the manufacturing element in politics, in influence, in weight of investel interests outwelghs public opinion and ras better access to the dominant parties of politics. You may walk the streets of Montreal asking questions of shopk-eepees, buyers, mechanics, and idlers and gain the impression that free trade in the continent is the wish and purpose of the people. But an houf's talk with the invested manufacturing chiefs will prove to you that the rich minority is more powerful at Ottawa and more effective at the polls than public sentiment.






