day with a plentiful wind and snow storm I did not stay to continue it but came back. Next Monday I hope to add another \$100. In no place hardly is a Church more needed than there: the congregations are always larger than they are either here or at Melford. I hope to be able to collect altogether \$400; will not the D. C. S. help us. It is quite saddening to see 70 people (my usual congregation there) all huddled together for Divine worship, in two rooms.

From the missionary at Glace Bay:-

The office bearers of the Glace Bay Branch of D. C. S. for this year are P.W. Johnston, Secretary, and myself President. I send you our list of subscription and hope that it will be in time for the Annual Report. It is \$94 this year against \$62 last. Although the coal trade, our main dependence here, has been very dull, I am glad that we have been able to increase our contributions to D. C. S. In the course of a few days I will send you the greater part of the Annual Subscriptions.
