

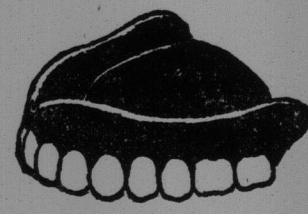

FAMOUS DOG IS NO MORE

"Prince," the Police Magistrate's Hound, Died a Few Days Ago — His Peculiar Penchant.

"Prince" is dead. For fifteen years he visited the courts in this city and always seemed to take a particular interest in the conduct of cases in the hall of justice. For some time a tumor had been growing on his back, and as he suffered considerably Dr. Berryman gave him chloroform, which resulted in his death.

"Prince" was a beautiful hound, and hardly a morning passed that he did not trot into the police court and sit at the foot of his master, Judge Ritchie. Spectators would always make room for Prince to enter, and once inside no common dog dare look into the court. The police court was not the only court that Prince visited. Frequently he went to the supreme court and sat right up to the feet of the presiding judge, and as the judges all knew and liked the hound, he never met with a cool reception.

During all the years that he visited the police court, he formed an acquaintance with the common drunks and when a familiar figure would loom up from the cells, he always went with his morning greetings to cheer the unfortunate. Prince is dead but his memory will live in the history of the St. John courts for years to come.

ROCKWOOD MAY BOOM

Plans Being Formed to Make Rockwood Park and Lily Lake an Up-to-date Amusement Resort.

There is every indication that Lily Lake and Rockwood Park will offer many up-to-date attractions to visitors and tourists during the approaching summer. Many improvements are contemplated and when these have been completed the park will rank as the foremost summer resort in the maritime provinces.

Frank White, A. O. Skinner, H. J. Smith, J. P. Gregory and D. Connell apply for incorporation as the Frank White Catering Company, with a capital of \$40,000.

The object of the company is to acquire and take over as a going concern the undertaking of Frank White as a general confectioner and caterer. Talking with the Times this morning, Mr. White said that as yet he had no definite plan in view of way of plans, but would leave in about two weeks for a visit to Atlantic City and a general tour of the southern resorts in order to get in touch with the most modern amusement schemes, which he would apply as far as practicable in Rockwood Park.

It is generally understood that a shooting-gallery will be erected at the edge of Lily Lake, and that this will be utilized as a toboggan slide in winter. Provision will be made for snow-shoe parties and there is some talk of a quarter mile track on the ice, for racing and big winter sports, such as those conducted in other cities.

With this in view, there is every reason to believe that the park and lake will form a strong attraction during the warm weather.

PORTLAND HAS HOPES

Maine Metropolis Thinks It May Some Day Become a Canadian Winter Port.

(Portland, Me. Advertiser.)

That the extension of the Portland and Rumford Falls railroad to the tide water at Portland means for the future another trans-Atlantic terminal in Portland, was intimated by Hugh J. Chisholm, president of the Portland and Rumford Falls railroad and the International Paper Co. in an interview with a reporter at the Lafayette hotel last night. Mr. Chisholm said that the proposed extension of the road to Portland for which a charter had been asked of the legislature, and the northern extension of the road to Megantic in Canada, would give the road connections with the Canadian Pacific railroad and that a railroad an Atlantic port with a 130-mile shorter haul than to St. John and 450 miles shorter haul than to Halifax.

Asked if a shorter haul by 130 miles, would in his opinion, be inducement for the Canadian Pacific, considering the growing competition in railroads, to abandon St. John for Portland as a terminus, he replied that supposing the harbors to be equal it would not, but that nature had placed objections to St. John; the extremely high tides and inconveniences of the harbor for large vessels, which barred it from receiving the large ships of the world, but how far in the future Portland might be used for a trans-Atlantic terminal other than by the Grand Trunk railway, time only would tell.

As a plain business proposition Portland was 130 miles nearer Megantic than Halifax. These facts had been considered by the interests that controlled the Portland and Rumford Falls railroad when the rights to extend to Megantic were obtained. It had been determined by the road when construction on that extension would be begun.

THE FISH MARKET

Local fish dealers report that the task of keeping up a good general stock during the past winter has been a difficult one, and a dearth in certain varieties, on which a consequence the price has advanced.

At present, however, there is a fairly good supply and Friday morning buyers should experience no trouble in this branch of the catering for the fast day dinner. The prices today are as follows: Cod, 6c. per pound; cod steak, 10c. per pound; halibut, 15c.; smelts, 12c.; flounders, 8c.; mackerel, 10c. to 20c.; gaspareaux, 7c. each; fresh herring, 18 to 20 cents per dozen; salmon, 15c. per pound; fresh had-dock, 8c. per pound, and finnan haddies 10c. a pound.
