## CHIEF JUSTICE BARKER HONORED BY BARRISTERS

Dinner Tendered to Him at Union Club Last Evening Was an Especially Happy Function—Guest of Honor the Recipient of Many Heartfelt Tributes.

The banquet which was tendered by the Barristers Society of New Brunswick in the Union Club Thursday to Hon. Frederick E. Barker in honor of his appointment as chief justice of the supreme court will long be remembered as one of the most representative gatherings of the legal profession here in many years. Nearly every county in the province was represented. The many eloquent references to the high qualities and attainments of the guest of honor and the enthusiasm with which the toast of his health was received left no doubt as to the popularity of his appointment or the personal esteem in which he is held by the members of the bar who practice before him. His brethren on the bench, the Hon. Chief Justice Tuck, and ex-Chief Justice Tuck, who were also guests of the society, spoke in eulogistic terms of the new chief.

About 100 guests sat down to the banquet, which began a few minutes before 8 o'clock. M. G. Teed, K. C., president of the society, was in the chair, having the guest of honor on his right and the lieutenant-governor on his left. The dinner was served with the usual well ordered appointments and culinary perfection for which the cuisine of the Union Club is noted. The menu was as follows:

On conclusion of the repeat and before the toasts were given by J. A. Barry, K. C., the secretary, read letters and telegrams of regret from Justice Landry, Dr. A. W. MacIsaac, Daniel Mullin, J. W. McCready, R. A. Lawlor, F. B. Carvell and Justice McLeod.

The president then proposed the health of the King, which was honored with the national anthem. Hon. J. H. Barry, K. C., the vice-president, in proposing the health of the lieutenant-governor, referred to his honor as not only being a member of the profession and actively identified with the profession of the law but as a worthy successor of a line of eminent men who had filled the office of lieutenant-governor and thoroughly alive to everything that would be of benefit to the province. (Cheers.)

After Rule Britannia had been sung, For He's a Jolly Good Fellow was given with much heartiness and enthusiasm. The lieutenant-governor in his opening remarks said he thought he had heard Mr. Hazen (who was seated at the far end of the dining hall) ask Mr. Belyea to speak louder. "If I don't make myself heard tonight," his honor continued amid a roar of laughter, "my friend, Mr. Hazen, will no doubt hear me tomorrow morning." After an allusion to his being in a position to say what he pleased as he had no advisors, his honor went on to speak in more serious vein of his appreciation of the high honor of his office and of his desire to do and act in a constitutional way. Speaking of the resources of the province, he referred to the lumber lands as the greatest asset and urged the vital importance of proper protection for the benefit of future generations. In closing, his honor paid a tribute to the popularity of the chief justice and applied to him amid applause the quotation "He is a just man and walks in his integrity."

Mr. Teed, in proposing the toast of the guest of honor, spoke eloquently of the high standard the profession in the days when he (the chief justice) was student practitioner and leading counsel. He urged on the younger members of the bar to give more study and close attention to the science of the law to fit themselves to fill the higher positions. Mr. Teed closed with a reference to the many high qualities of the chief justice.

The drinking of the toast was the signal for a tremendous outburst of enthusiasm and continued cheering. The chief justice said he felt very deeply the honor done him. He felt he did not deserve the many complimentary references made. His honor then expressed the opinion that the bar had not degenerated, and urged on the younger members the necessity of close attention to their duties. He referred eloquently to the long line of public men which the bar of New Brunswick had contributed to Canada, mentioning Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Justice King, Mr. Justice Burbridge, Hon. E. L. Wetmore, chief justice of Saskatchewan, several lieutenant-governors and the last eleven premiers and leaders of the provincial assembly.

## LABOR LEADERS

MUCH WORRIED

Over the Ruling of the U. S. Supreme Court that Unions Are Trusts.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—A conference of far-reaching importance to labor began here Wednesday. Participating are the Congress, the American Federation of Labor together with the executive committee of the International Trade Union of America who met pursuant to a call issued by Mr. Gompers to consider the consequences of the recent injunction decisions of the supreme court of the United States affecting labor organizations with particular reference to the Danbury Hatters case in which that court substantially held that labor organizations were to be considered trusts as such as organizations of capital.

After calling attention to the significance of these decisions Mr. Gompers stated that the conference was for the purpose of taking such action as the importance and merits of the subjects dealt with may be considered and determined setting forth the position and demands of labor. The court's decision, he said, was binding upon all labor organizations until changed or modified by congressional action.

The object of the conference therefore was to consider the proposed amendments to the Sherman anti-trust act which have been drafted with a view not of exempting labor organizations from their obligations to the public but rather to prevent any injustice being done through the operation of law to organizations of laboring men, particularly through injunction.

It is desired to so frame the proposed changes in the Sherman law as to meet the requirements of the supreme court's decisions. The proposed amendments are the result of recent conferences at the White House between Pres. Roosevelt and others and it is hoped to secure ratification along these lines at this session of congress.

Pres. Gompers Wednesday stated that matters of importance to every union man would be discussed and an effort made to formulate plans to offset the rulings of the various courts regarding injunctions and boycotts.

There are 117 national and international trade unions in America and practically all of them were represented by one of more delegates at Wednesday's meeting. The conference which was held behind closed doors will continue several days.
