A gentleman who has lately visited the Argentine supplies the Glasgow News with a description of the chief newspaper of fice in Buenos Ayres. Offices of the kind in London are simply not "in it" when compared with this South American building. He says it is a palatial establishment. where straw-hatted reporters of descent from authentic Spanish hidalgoes sat in sumptuous armchairs smoking long cigars afifd refreshing themselves with rectified sodas while "copy" was in process of manufacture. The editor's room was like something from the Ritz, the Carlton, or the Yildız Kiosk before the revolution, and each and all of his leading men had almost equally impressive apartments.

The office included a large ball room and a public library, while there was in residence a physician whom readers of the paper might consult free at any hour of the day or night without any danger of his prescriptions being confined to the
