CELEBRATES HIS 100th BIRTHDAY Francis Harvey of Lombard Street is the Oldest Man in New Brunswick.

Francis Harvey, who resides with his daughter, Mrs. Danery, at 71 Lombard street, was 100 years old yesterday, and the celebration of his centennial will take place on Monday evening next. Mr. Harvey was born at the little village of Stoke Dansey, near Plymouth, England. In 1811 his grandfather came to this province and became the pioneer of English settlement in Kings Co. Two years later the family came to this city from the old country. They remained here but a short time and went to Kings Co.

When but six years of age Mr. Harvey moved to St. John, and until he was too old, he lived on the farm that had been granted to his father. Mr. Harvey is still able to walk but his eyesight and hearing have failed lately and he is troubled with asthma. He has five children living, Charles, the eldest, being about 70 years old. The others are Agnes, Helen, Ellen and Sarah. The other eight children are dead.

Mr. Harvey had all the children by his first wife, who was Jane Berry, daughter of Ed. Perry, of English Settlement. Mrs. Jane Thorne, the second wife, also a native of English Settlement, is still living, though seventy-eight years old. Mr. Harvey has living 17 grandchildren and 38 great-grandchildren.

A SURE LIVE TOWN A very interesting illustrated postal card received from Philadelphia conveys the following information about the City of Brotherly Love and civic reform:-- "Talk about a nice quiet town--This is it. When I got off the train I heard a noise and asked if it was the hum of business. 'No,' replied the policeman, 'that is the snore of the town.' On Chestnut street they have a waxworks show. In one window is a dying soldier; in the other a sleeping beauty. That tells the whole story. The City Party is now in power, and working for the city; as soon as they get and divide it, there will be a chance for the old gang as a reform party. There is something doing in the amusement line all the time. In the mornings the people watch Wanamaker's new building going up. In the afternoon they walk Chestnut street or go down to the river and see the ferry boats cross. They sometimes stay up as late as 10.30 p. m. It surely is a strenuous life. The principal products are cat-fish and waffles, and scrapple."

CHAMPLAIN MONUMENT A Gordon Leavitt is another enthusiastic supporter of the Champlain monument. Mr. Leavitt favors the Queen Square site and is of the opinion that the monument will be an incentive to children to learn the history of the French in Canada. Jos. E. THE VICTORIAN ORDER OF NURSES Annual Meeting Held Yesterday Afternoon in York Assembly Rooms.

The annual meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses, held yesterday afternoon in the York assembly rooms, was largely attended. Hon. J. G. Forbes presided and the eighth annual report was presented by H. D. McLeod. The private subscriptions for the year were only \$187, against \$226.07 collected in 1905; while the total work has increased. The number of new cases visited during the year were 228, against 148 the previous year, and the patients whom the nurses visited during the past year were 311, against 288 the previous year, and the total number of visits made 3,168, against 2,767 the preceding year. The collection made during the year by the nurses from patients were \$226.43, while for the year previous \$302.00 was collected. The report spoke highly of the work of the nurses, Miss E. M. Maxwell and Miss M. M. Muir. In addition to their arduous day duties the nurses made eight calls at night.

Of the cases attended, 139 were medical, 177 surgical, 104 obstetrical, 104 were chronic, and thirty-eight operations were also included in the list. The thanks of the board was tendered the city for the continuation of the allowance made last year. It was noted in the report that permanent fund has been started and placed at interest to be used in case of emergency. The necessity of engaging a night nurse had also been discussed by the board and one may be secured. In the meantime arrangements will be made with attending physicians.

Speeches were made by Dr. Thomas Walker, Hon. R. J. Ritchie and Rev. David Lang. The meeting then proceeded to the election of a new board of directors, and the following were chosen: Mrs. Tuck, Mrs. Dever, Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Ellis, Mrs. Thomson, Mrs. McCallan, Hon. G. C. Forbes, Hon. R. J. Ritchie, Dr. T. Walker, H. D. McLeod, Ald. Bullock, and J. G. Taylor. The board will meet in Mrs. Ellis's home Monday evening for the election of officers.

It was announced that Miss Muir will, on account of her health, resign about the middle of March, and her place will be filled by Miss McPherson, of Toronto. Votes of thanks were passed to R. J. Armstrong for the use of the room free of charge, to the press and corporation of the city. It was decided to prevail on Mr. McLeod, who had resigned the secretaryship, to reconsider the matter and be consented to retain the office another year.

PRETORIAN IN PORT The Allan line steamship Pretorian arrived off Partridge Island last night and is now at her berth at the I. C. R. wharf. She has on board 17 second-class and 13 steerage passengers. The Pretorian experienced very tempestuous weather and for five days met with a succession of strong gales and head seas. She brought to Halifax 51 cabin and 383 steerage passengers.

The valuation of the outward cargo of the Donaldson line steamship Athalia, now on her way to Glasgow, is as follows: P. R. steamer, 898,100; foreign goods, \$69,290. Total \$1,367,390. The valuation of the outward cargo of the U. P. R. steamer Lake Manitouche, now on her way to Liverpool, from this port, is as follows: Canadian goods, \$85,175; foreign goods, 297,500. Total, \$382,675. P. R. steamer Montfort, from Bristol, arrived off the island at 5 o'clock last evening and docked at No. 3 berth. The Montfort left Bristol, Feb. 9, and was twelve days coming out. The passage was rough. For the first ten days the steamer encountered strong head winds with high seas and fog. Coming up the bay the steamer met strong winds and fog. She brought five second class passengers, two horses and 1,000 tons of cargo.

W. B. L. Ledger brought out a fine trap horse and a fancy English hooded gig. Mr. Ledger is taking the horse and rig to Regis. H. A. Patterson, another passenger, brought out a valuable thoroughbred stallion, "Clyde'sdale Stillwell." Mr. Patterson is taking the horse to Manitouche for breeding purposes.

Only three hatches of the boat could work last evening on account of the after part of the ship lying outside the Empire of Ireland. The two horses were in the after part and they could not be landed. The Montfort makes the third C. P. R. steamer in port.

TO SUPPLY LUMBERMEN Adjutant A. Jennings of the Salvation Army passed through yesterday on his way to Halifax from the forestry convention at Fredericton. While in Fredericton he arranged with a number of lumbermen to supply them with men. Those who have already arranged with him are W. B. Snowball, J. F. Gregory, James Beveridge, R. Connolly, W. R. MacMillan, Mr. Hutchinson, T. B. Colton and W. H. Miller. The men are expected to arrive on steamers at this port. Chartered steamers remaining to Halifax will bring about 1,500.

FUNERALS The funeral of the late William Hogan, whose body was brought to this city from Dorchester yesterday, was held this morning at 9.30 o'clock from the residence of J. P. Quinn, Elm street. The remains were taken to St. Peter's church, where Rev. A. D. Cormier, of Dorchester, read the funeral service. Interment was made in the old Catholic cemetery.

The funeral of the late Wm. McG. Thompson was held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the residence of his son-in-law, Wm. Stynes, Fairville. Rev. T. J. Denistadt read the burial service at 2.30 p. m. at the house and interment was made in Cedar Hill cemetery.

BUNCOED THE CHINAMAN Charlie Sun, a Chinaman, who arrived here last night from Montreal, believes he has been buncoed by a French woman, who accompanied him from the Canadian metropolis and whom he claims to have hired to serve as waitress in a Chinese restaurant here. Charlie says he paid her expenses, advanced \$29 of her salary and bought her a new suit case for \$5.

Passengers on the train noticed that she was receiving attention from another man and when the train stopped at Salisbury she got out at one door and her new acquaintance at the other. She left the Oriental a note saying she would be in St. John today, but Charlie thinks he has only experience to show for his \$15.
