
# Thirty Dutch Ships With Grain Cargoes

Belgians to Get Food Quickly and Neutrals Have Some of Wants Supplied; Arrangement Made at Washington

Washington, Aug. 25—Belgians will get food quickly and neutrals will have some of their wants supplied through an arrangement entered into yesterday by the food commission and the government of the neutral European countries.

It was decided to let thirty or more Dutch ships sail at once from an Atlantic port carrying grain owned by the Netherlands government on condition that the greater part of the cargoes shall be used for relief of the Belgians. It was also announced that the Swedish mission had sold at cost 552,000 bushels of wheat in this country to the Belgian Relief Commission. The wheat was bought by the Swedish government in last January and has been held in elevators ever since. This will go forward immedi-
