

MORE WEALTHY TOURISTS COME TO PROVINCE

Auto Association Secretary
Makes Statement on
Travel of 1926

MORE LOCAL PEOPLE
SEE NEW BRUNSWICK

Promotion Work Done in
Upper Canada; Good
Results Expected

As a comparison of the class of motor tourist parties arriving in the province this season with those of 1924, J. C. Berrie, secretary of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, said yesterday afternoon that while only two of the Millionaires' Club of America had visited the province two years ago, to date this season 12 members had arrived here and inquiries had been received as to roads, etc., from 50 more.

Mr. Berrie cited the above as an example of the great improvement in the class of people visiting New Brunswick. While the reports of the number of cars which have crossed the border into New Brunswick during June have not been received as yet, Mr. Berrie intimated that, considering the lateness of the season, the travelers would equal

and perhaps exceed the number of those who visited the province in 1925.

WIDER SCOPE
The work of the N. B. A. A. has taken on a wider scope this year than ever before, according to Mr. Berrie. An excellent new road map of the Maritime Provinces has been published and will be distributed to members of the association. On the opposite side of the map a list of hotels, garages, restaurants, etc., recommended by the association, appears. These road maps will also be mailed to a number of points in Canada and the United States.

Mr. Berrie further remarked that the association was placing a large number of signs, pointing out the proper roads to take, dangerous curves, etc., in prominent places along the provincial roads. Speaking of the roads, Mr. Berrie said that a great deal of logging was being done. Although the result of this logging will, generally, not be known this season, it is expected to be of great use to the association and automobilists next year.

TAKING MOTOR TRIPS
It was further pointed out by Mr. Berrie that a greater number of members of the N. B. A. A. than ever before have gone on motor trips, or have signified their intention of doing so this summer. Several of these motorists have made it a point to bring in information regarding the condition of the roads or other matters to the attention of the association.

PERMIT CARDS
In continuation of their campaign to make traveling by automobile as convenient as possible for their members and Canadian motorists, as well as American and other motor tourist parties, the New Brunswick Automobile Association have had printed a large number of permit cards.

These cards are to be filled out and signed by motorists crossing the border into the United States. One part is kept by the owner or driver of the car and the other half is retained by customs officials at the boundary. On their return trip the motorists surrender their half to the officials and they are allowed to enter the Dominion with no further questioning other than as regards additional equipment, money to their cars while in the United States. Duty will be charged on these additional provisions by the customs officials according to the directions on the permit.

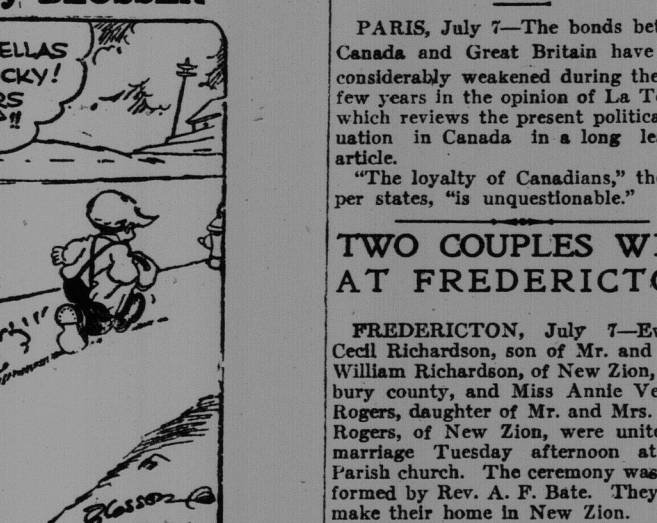

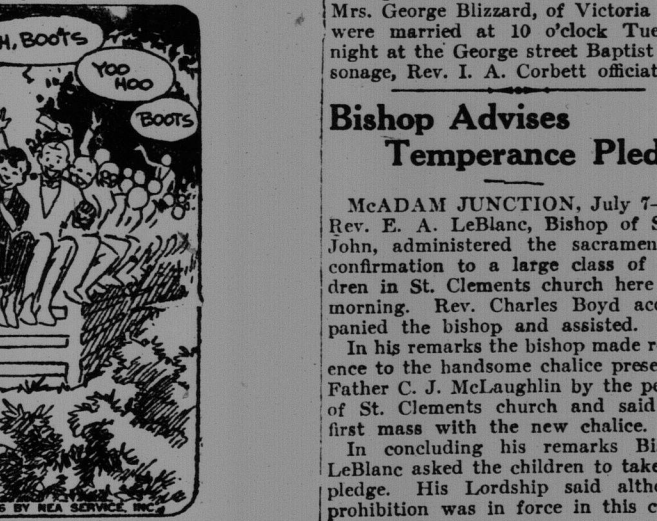
